



Truck Driver Escapes Injury

SUMMERSIDE — The operator of a tractor-trailer escaped without injury yesterday morning when the rig jackknifed and overturned on a curve at Central Bedeque, about seven miles east of here. The driver was from Truro, N.S.

Robert Elroy Haines, the owner as well as driver, said following the accident, that the trailer hit a patch of ice while proceeding along the curve, causing it to jackknife. The accident, which occurred at approximately 5 a.m., saw the tractor-trailer come to rest on its side on the opposite side of the road.

At the time of the crash the vehicle was proceeding towards Halifax with 695 cases of frozen peas picked up earlier at Seabrooks frozen food plant in New Annan.

Another tractor trailer was on the scene late this morning along with a number of workmen who were transferring the cases from the overturned vehicle. At that time, although all cases had not been removed from the first trailer, it was unofficially estimated that some 20 cases had sustained damage.

The Borden RCMP detachment investigated the accident.

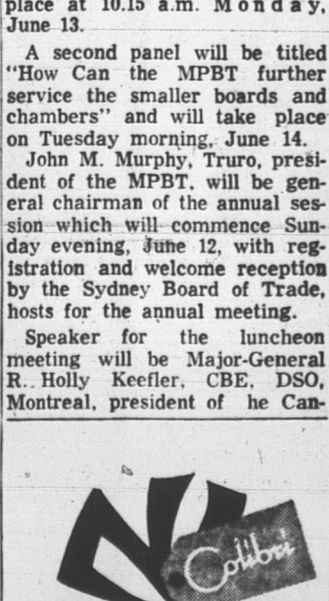

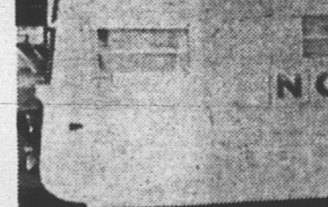
"I always felt a glow of happiness and good will every time I met him. This province has lost a fine business man, a loyal earnest supporter of every worthy cause and a Christian."
