Murray River Native Dies At New Glasgow, N.S.

NEW GLASGOW, N.S., April 1--(CP)—Lethal Reynolds, native of Murray River, P. E. I., and owner of a taxi business here, died today from a heart attack. Among survivors is his mother, who is 89 years of age and lives at Murray River.

Sees Room For Development In This Province

"I think there is plenty of room for development in Prince Edward Island, particularly in Kings County," stated Mr. George Saville, Fifth Kings, during his speech on the short lived debate on the budget.

In Lots 54 and 55 there is a lot of woods, he stated and the land is not 50 per cent under cultivation. There is room for 150 new farms in these areas. There is a lot of good farmland in the East Point district which, if used, would be of great benefit to Souris, he stated.

He said that there was a tremendous increase in farm values in recent years and that cattle were now worth four or five times as much as they were 10 years ago.

He thought that roads were good revenue producers as last year over \$1,000,000 was collected in gasoline taxes. He estimated that the opening of roads in winter time brought the Government more money through gasoline taxes than was spent on opening the roads.

The people in the Georgetown area are patient in waiting for the paving of the Georgetown highway, he stated. The road was now prepared for paving he continued as soon as the weather permits. The road was prepared for a heavy coat of pavement last year, he noted.

The Seven Mile Road needs paving, he continued. The people of Dundas are pretty progressive and would like to see an early start made on the road. He also hoped for an early start on the paving of the road from Annandale to Rollo Bay and pointed out that the people from Murray Harbour North and Gaspereaux wanted a road to Montague and Murray River.

He stated that he would like to see some improvement in the method of distributing relief money. Some people are getting relief money who should not get it and some ask for it when they do not need it, he stated.

The Minister was doing all he could but he doubted if the system of sending investigators out through the province was the best way of finding out conditions. He thought that the clergymen or magistrates would have a much better idea than the investigators about existing conditions.

He suggested that the Minister of Industry and Natural Resources might get in touch with Ottawa in an effort to provide legislation for folding draggers to operate on roads or eight miles of land.

Draggers would enable a few men to make a lot of money while the fishermen who fishes from the shore would be poorer than he is today, Mr. Saville stated.

He could not understand people who were saying that the teachers were underpaid, he stated. The expenditures have increased tremendously in the past 15 years, he continued, and the Government is helping out the districts.

Mr. Saville stated that the benefits of the Eskimo trade would be seen in future years. We have heard a great deal about what the people in St. Johns have thought about the ship but we have never heard what the poor fishermen in their outports thought about her, he said.

He noted that the Dominion Government paid out a lot of money to the Province. "In the past two years the Federal Government has paid out over \$200,000 in boat harbours alone, he states. About \$400,000 will be spent on Souris harbour this year, he added.

He stated that the Province had a great deal to show for her deficit. We have more than 100 miles of new roads, a large number of new schools, cold storage plant potato warehouses and many other things, he stated.

He concluded by saying that there might be an election this year and that this might be his swan song in the Legislature. As it turned out it was the swan song in the budget debate as the debate collapsed immediately afterwards.
