AGAINST PROHIBITION.

The Anglican Archbishop and the Synod of Rupert's Land.

In View of the Plebiscite.

WINNIPEG, May 10.—At the synod of Rupert's Land on Saturday last, Archbishop McCrae stated distinctly that if the Government ordered a plebiscite on the prohibition question, that he would vote against prohibition. He had, he said, come to the conclusion that while the Scriptures condemn drunkenness in the most severe terms and make it a special sin, yet he regarded wine as a good gift of God and the very emblem of joy. He believed that prohibition could not be enacted, and that it was an interference with the rights of citizens. The proper course to pursue was, he said, for the Government to control the saloons,—indeed they might be removed altogether. The motion against the plebiscite was carried by the Synod.

THE GREEK AND THE TURK.

Turkey Will Demand Indemnity

No Opposition to Recall of Greeks From Crete.

LONDON, May 10.—A despatch from Constantinople says that it is probable that Turkey will demand a war indemnity of over six millions. Turkey will certainly claim a fair allowance of the rights of a victor; and in this claim she will be supported by Russia and Germany.

LONDON, May 10.—An Athens despatch states that there is so great a change in public sentiment that no opposition whatever will be provoked in respect to the decision to recall the army from Crete.

TOBACCO FACTORY CLOSED,

12,000 Hands Out of Work.

MONTREAL, May 10.—W. C. McDonald's tobacco factory, employing 1,200 hands, was closed on Saturday on account of the change recently made in the tariff.

Salisbury and the Princess.

NEW YORK, May 10.—A special despatch to the Sun from London, says that Lord Salisbury is said to have joined in a quarrel in the Prince of Wales Household, by protesting against the action of the Princess in subscribing to the Chronicle fund for the relief of the Greek sick and wounded fund. This is an avowedly partizan movement and the action of one so near the throne is contrary to all the precedents.

Japan is contemplating a great increase in her army and navy. Not content with the fine ships captured from the Chinese the navy will be further strengthened by seventeen more, of which four are to be battle-ships, so that in nine years the Japanese navy will consist of sixty-five ships. The army is to be doubled in eight years, it will then number 520,000 men on a war footing. To carry out this scheme thirty millions sterling are to be expended in initial outlay, and it is calculated that four million will be annually required for their yearly maintenance.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

PARIS, May 7.—President Faure has received a despatch from the czar expressing his majesty's sympathy with the families of the victims of the charity bazaar fire, and stating that Russia has been profoundly moved at the catastrophe.

BUENOS AYRES, May 7.—I am informed by the Herald's correspondent in Rio Janeiro, Brazil, that the Brazilian congress opened today. The president in his message said that the army of Brazil must be reorganized at once in order to immediately crush the rebellion of the fanatics. He also called attention to the decrease of the national revenue, owing to the commercial crisis here and the prevailing low prices of Brazilian produce in foreign markets.

LONDON, May 7.—The South African committee of the House of Commons which is enquiring into the Transvaal raid had another session to-day in the committee room of Westminster Hall. The Duke of Abercorn, president of the chartered company of British South Africa, was examined. He said the board of directors of the company had no knowledge whatever of the raid before it occurred, nor suspicions of any intention upon the part of anyone to use the chartered company's forces against the Transvaal.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 7.—The Oceanic Phosphate Company has chartered the schooner Louisa D., which will tomorrow start in search of an island reputed to be rich in guano, and located on some maps as southeast of Hawaiian Islands, in lat 16 degrees north, long 137 degrees west. For years sailors have tried in vain to locate the island, and last year the projectors of the present search sent the schr. Moonlight to discover the treasure, but the captain lost his bearings. The island is named simply New Island. The schooner is equipped with provisions and gear to last eight months.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 7.—The steamer Miowera brings the news that Australia is again suffering from a terrible drought. The different governments are proclaiming days of prayer in consideration of the very serious calamities from the protracted drought. All churches are also announcing days of prayer. In western Australia the greatest suffering is experienced. Within 90 miles of the coast all timber, with the exception of the river gums, has entirely died out. The last summer rain that fell there was in February, 1892. With the exception of a fair fall of six inches in the winter of 1894, there has been no rain since to do more than keep the stock alive, although inland stations had fair falls. It is said all taxes on government land will be remitted, and steps will be taken to feed the hungry.

VALPARAISO, May 7.—The government of Chile has offered a premium of \$100,000 yearly to any person or persons who may discover a new use for nitrate in large quantities. Chile produces a great quantity of nitrate, and a market which will use more than a comparatively small quantity has never been found.

LONDON, May 7.—A special despatch from Capetown says that the army reserve of the colony of Natal has been notified to hold itself in readiness for active service. The authorities of the Transvaal have instructed their field-cornets to thoroughly patrol the Natal border and report instantly any suspicious movements. A circular from the Transvaal has been distributed in Cape Colony and in the Orange Free State calling upon the Afrikaners for help, saying: "We do not want your money nor moral support. We want you to come and help us."

MOUNT FOREST, Ont., May 7.—A very sad and distressing accident happened some miles from here in Proton township by which Mrs. Dean, a widow, met her death. It appears that while visiting Mrs. Jacks, a neighbor, the subject of how to dispose of tramps was being discussed, when Mr. Jacks said, bringing a revolver, "this is how we do it," and in answer to Mrs. Dean's request to take that out of her sight, said it was not loaded. Mrs. Dean finally proceeded to examine it, and as it was pointed toward her, and being a self-cocker, it in some way exploded, sending the bullet into her body. She jumped to her feet and exclaimed, "I am shot!" and running to the door fell dead. The sad affair has cast a gloom over the entire neighborhood, and much sympathy is felt for both the Jacks and the family of the victim.

A despatch to the London Times from Cape Town says the Secretary of Agriculture announced to the House of Assembly on Tuesday last that the rinderpest had broken out in Aliwal North and Burgersdorp, and that there was every prospect that it would sweep the colony to the coast.
