Lecture at Emerald.

CONSIDERING the very severe storm, quite a large and intelligent audience assembled in the B. L. S. Hall at Emerald on the evening of the 6th inst. to hear Mr. S. M. Beat, of the Summers Journal, deliver his highly interesting lecture on the great journalist and poet—John Boyle O'Reilly. Dr. Wall, who presided, in a short and pointed speech introduced the lecturer, who on coming forward was heartily cheered. The lecture was well and carefully written, and in a very distinct and interesting manner. It would not take his listeners long to understand that he had given close and careful study to the subject of his lecture. He gave a minute outline of his life, his editorial and literary work, and his pre-eminence as the poet and friend of humanity.

After the lecture, a very amusing and entertaining musical programme was given. Miss Blanche Craig presided at the organ, and in the rendition of her selections displayed enviable qualities of taste, touch and time. She certainly made a very creditable debut. The vocal portion of the programme was excellently rendered. The choruses by the Kinkora choir were good; the duet by D. A. and D. J. Cameron was heartily enjoyed; whilst the humorous songs and witty remarks of W. F. Clarke relieved the entertainment of that gravity so noticeable on such occasions. At the close a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the lecturer. Evicted Tenants Commission. The Evicted Tenants Commission resumed its session on Wednesday. Sir James Matthew presiding. Mr. Dillon made an earnest plea on behalf of the re-instatement of evicted tenants and produced statistics showing a number of good settlements made through the plan of campaign between the landlords and their tenants. These settlements have been brought about through the good sense and the good feeling of the landlords and their tenants. Upon some of them a battle was fought for a time with that stubbornness and that tenacity which characterized the people, whether they be landlords or tenants or their allies on either side. Nevertheless, Dillon informed the commission, there were thousands of evicted tenants whose condition was so pitiable and desperate that it constituted a menace to the public peace, and he urgently advised that measures be adopted for their relief, both on the ground of humanity and of public security. Mr. Dillon also spoke severely of those landlords who were apparently endeavoring to embarrass the government by their merciless evictions at this severe season.

James O'Connor, a leading member of the Irish evicted tenants' association, is reported as saying that they did not want to hamper Mr. Gladstone or Mr. Morley in any way, but that they were determined to do all in their power to get the evicted tenants reinstated on their farms. Unless the landlords wanted to see the agitation of the past twelve years recommenced and repeated, they would bring about a satisfactory settlement with the evicted tenants. The country, he said, was like a match, and there needed very little to set into a flame as big a land war as there ever was before.

Mr. Dillon stated that the total amount received from all sources for the support of the evicted tenants under the plan of campaign was £234,000.

Russian Outrages.

THE MOST HEINOUS CRUELITIES PRACTICED UPON BOTH SEXES OF THE STUDIST FAITH. The Moscow correspondent of the London Daily Chronicle describes at length the unparagoned persecutions of the Studists in the Kirghistan peninsula, he says, has been carried on in the provinces of western and southern Russia since 1875. Imprisonment, banishment, beatings, floggings and outrages that he would have considered incredible unless he had personally verified each case, have been the lot of the wretched people. In one village of the Kirghistan district the governor arrived early in September to enquire into the state of religion. He was assisted by local priests. Eventually the orthodox religion was determined to abandon their lands and shops, and to work on the communal lands during the day and do sentry duty in the village at night, so that they were hardly able to visit their homes at all.

Recently even women with nursing infants were compelled to assist in communal field work. The orthodox peasants superintended the others and inflicted with impunity all sorts of brutality on the Studists whenever the latter lagged in the fields or fell asleep when on sentry duty. Still eventually menaced by mobs the Studists still refused to embrace the orthodox religion. To make an example the village elder one night summoned police and peasantry to his aid and took possession of a but whose Studist owner was absent on sentry duty.

The but was fumigated with a noxious weed so that the sleeping children were almost suffocated. As the mother still refused to abjure her faith she was subjected to frightful indignities. The party visited other houses where similar scenes were enacted. These horrible scenes were of nightly occurrence until all the Studists were driven to seek refuge in the steppes. Appeals to the law had no effect.

Horse Notes.

In the States a pacer must be able to put in three heats in 2:09 or better, and a trotter in 2:12 or better, in order to win the money at the big meetings these days. Every year is a great year for the Wilkes family, but 1892 has been by a long odds the greatest.

Mares by horses with fast records are more likely to throw speed when bred to stallions with fast records than any other class of dams. There is a good deal too much hero worship of certain trainers and drivers, who are not actually so far superior to their fellows. The man whose constant thought and patient hand brings a horse out and proves that the animal is a race-horse and a winner in his class accomplishes a harder task than a Doble or a Splan, who guides him to record-breaking feats against time or inferior competitors.

We need, before the days of kite tracks and bike sulks, to sit in the grand stand and watch a good honest race from 2:25 back to 2:30, and talk about what good horses it took to last out the seven heats. Now we want something better than 2:15 or a broken record or we do not care to watch a race. That is what the inventions of three years have made of the average admirer of trotting horses.

Feed your colts liberally. If they come from the pasture poor, just give them extra feed, barley, meal, cracked oats, and even corn, with occasionally a feed of potatoes and carrots. They need exercise and light, clean, well ventilated and warm stalls. They need to be kept clean, and the first thing you should be certain about is that they are not affected with lice or worms.

Rysyck's Hambletonian died March 27, 1876, having made 24 seasons in the stud, during which a total of 1,931 mares have been bred to him, an average of a little over a year, from which there are known to have been 1,836 foals. In his 15th year 216 were bred to him, producing 150 foals.

A man from Petamula came to Ariel Lathrop and wanted to sell him a fine looking Nutwood mare. Mr. Lathrop asked if the mare was registered. The man's reply staggered him: "No sir, I don't believe in this registration business. It does not amount to anything." When Mr. Lathrop told him that he would give one third more for the mare than he was asking if she was registered, the man from Petamula changed his mind about registration and forthwith stabled to it, and when he produced the certificate Mr. Lathrop purchased the mare. She is one of the finest looking individuals in the state. Registration pays after all.—Breeder & Sportsman.

Canadian Wheat.

Canada's wheat product is receiving a good deal of attention in the British markets at present. Comparisons made with the western American product, as against Manitoba's wheat, are in favor of the latter. To this end, Dunlop Bros., Glasgow, have issued a report which states that, while Duluth and other spring wheats are rather disappointing, Manitoba again comes to the front this season. This report continues, says Manitoba has exported freely to the British market, and though the quantity has been large, the quality is not inferior, for Manitoba wheat is handsome, heavier, and every way much more attractive than Minnesota wheat. Manitoba's No. 5 hard wheat has become popular in the English and Scottish markets. Manitoba wheat, Nos. 1 and 2 hard, finds a ready sale. The prices are as follows:—Quoting from yesterday's London transactions—Manitoba, No. 1 hard, sold at thirty shillings, C. J. F., No. 2 winter, at twenty-eight shillings.

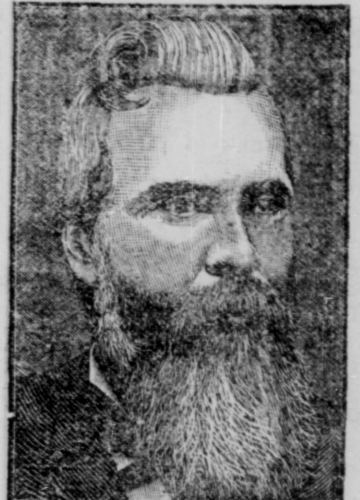

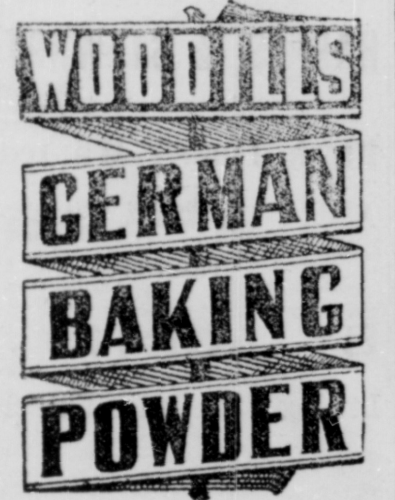
