United Baptist Association Met At Murray River

The spring district meetings of the United Baptist Association of Prince Edward Island were held in the United Baptist Church at Murray River, Tuesday, May 8. The Vice Moderator, Mr. Charles Seranton, was in the chair. The pastor of the Murray River Church, Rev. A.M. Rogerson led the delegates in a brief period of worship, after which the delegates were welcomed to the Church at Murray River.

On request of the Maritime Religious Education Council, Miss Grace Crosby of Charlottetown was appointed to represent the Association on the Girls Work Board of the Council. A resolution committee was appointed from the chair consisting of Mr. Colin Waugh, Mrs. A.K. MacPhee and Mr. Heber MacPhail.

Rev. C.A. Britten, D.D. of Central Bedouque gave the Key Man's report which covered denominational funds and contributions to Moncton Bible School. He said that in some things on Prince Edward Island the people are way ahead of the rest of the world, but in denominational giving they are way behind. He urged upon the delegates the importance of their churches meeting their allotments.

Rev. D.I. McClare, East Point, stated that his church would entertain the Association when it meets in June in the place of the United Baptist Church of Central Bedouque.

The delegates of the various churches represented at the meetings were called upon to give brief reports of the work being done in their churches. These reports indicated that in all the churches the work is holding its own and in many cases is showing advancement. There seems to be a spiritual awakening among the United Baptists on the Island.

On motion of Mr. Heber MacPhail seconded by Mr. Victor Runtz, the appreciation of the District was extended to Rev. C.A. Britten, D.D., Rev. C.O. Howlett, and Rev. E.J. Barras, D.D. for their long and faithful service in the work of the Kingdom of God, they being the first ordinaries of the ministers now serving in the Maritime United Baptist Convention.

Mr. Colin Waugh, Wilnot Valley, chaired a panel discussion on "Ways and means to strengthen the Baptist witness on P. E. I." Participants in the panel were Mr. Victor Runtz, Charlottetown, who spoke on the "Radio ministry", emphasizing its importance and stating that it reached people who could not be reached otherwise. Mrs. E.S. Rose, Souris, outlined the history of "Church Sects and Splitter Groups" stating that Christianity began as a sect, in Judaism, that sects have sprung up all through the existence of the church with Baptists them-

selves having begun as a sect.

Rev. E.J. Barras, D.D., in speaking on "Church Potential", said that Baptists have a future on the Island, and must be prepared to meet the challenge it will bring. He set forth two plans either of which might be used after careful consideration to strengthen the Baptist witness. The first plan called for the extensive use of laymen in providing regular services of worship for all churches in a given area, regardless of whether they have a pastor or not. The second plan called for a pastor at large.

Mr. Ralph Adams, O'Leary, spoke on "Stewardship," stating that few, if any, of the Baptist people are giving to the point of sacrifice. The discussion resulted in the establishing of a committee consisting of the pastors under the chairmanship of Dr. Barras to consider the plans and present a workable solution to the Association. The committee to seek the assistance of the lay people in the matter of finance, came into being on motion of Mr. Heber MacPhail seconded by Mr. Ralph Adams.

Mr. Alfred Tait led the worship service which opened the afternoon session. Mrs. Aletha Runtz was soloist for this service. Following the worship service, Rev. Keith Hobson of Summerside outlined the plans of the Board of Evangelism of the Maritime United Baptist convention. Mr. Hobson said that the present plan called for evangelistic services in all United Baptist churches in the Maritime Provinces in 1957. The campaigns would be of two types, centralized and regional. A steering committee consisting of Mr. Alfred Tait, Mr. Brent Wood, Mr. Colin Waugh was appointed to work with Mr. Hobson on the plans for evangelism.

Dr. Barras was then given a few minutes to further outline his plans for strengthening the Baptist witness on Prince Edward Island. The remainder of the afternoon was given to the Women's Missionary Society.

At the evening session the minutes of the day's meetings were read and approved. Miss Barbara Pound, Charlottetown, was appointed to the Children's Work Board of the Maritime Religious Education Council.

The worship service began with the singing of the Hymn, "The Light of the World is Jesus". The Vice Moderator, Mr. Seranton, read the scripture lesson which was taken from the Gospel according to Saint John, chapter 3, after which Rev. D.I. McClare led in prayer. The Charlottetown Male Chorus sang "The Beautiful Land" and "Child Come Home". Rev. C.E. Armstrong, Hazelbrook, brought the message of the evening on the story of Nicodemus. The session closed with the benediction as pronounced by Mr. Armstrong.
