

Giants Defeat Braves As Cards Lose To Pirates

NEW YORK (AP)—New York Giants paraded eight runs across the plate in the third inning Wednesday and won a 12-6 decision over Milwaukee Braves.

Thirteen Giants came to the plate in the third, while seven hit, rattled off the New York bats and sent loser Gene Conley to the showers. There also were two walks, a double steal and two Milwaukee errors in this inning.

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Right-hander Ronnie Kline of Pittsburgh Pirates hurled a brilliant six-hit shutout Wednesday night as the cellar-dwelling Bucs beat St. Louis Cardinals 2-0. The defeat kept the Cards 7½ games back of first-place Milwaukee.

The defeat was a severe blow to Larry Jackson and the Cards, who had hoped to pick up a full

game after the Braves lost a 12-6 afternoon contest to New York Giants. Jackson gave up only six hits as he went down to his seventh defeat in 19 decisions.

The victory was the fourth in a row for Kline who now has a 5-15 record.

DETROIT (AP)—Ted Williams broke up a pitching duel between Boston's Frank Sullivan and Detroit's Jim Bunning Wednesday with a seventh-inning home run that gave the Red Sox a 1-0 victory.

Williams' drive was the second half-inning off loser Bunning. Bill Klau got the other Red Sox hit, a fourth-inning single.

CHICAGO (AP)—New York Yankees ganged up on Chicago's Billy Pierce for two runs in each

of the fourth and sixth innings for a 4-2 lead over the White Sox through six innings of a rain-delayed game at Comiskey Park Wednesday night.

Simon, Hall Predict KO's, McGuire Praises Trainor

Gary "The German" Simon from New Glasgow, who has never been knocked off his feet in his professional career, and Dick Hall of Boston who has never lost a professional fight, meet one another tonight in what is expected to be a grueling ten round boxing bout at the Sports Arena.

Both fighters checked into the City bright and early yesterday evening and both were quick to say that the fight would never go the ten round limit.

Simon repeated his promise that his work would be over when he disposed of Hall in the sixth round and Hall's trainer, Mickey McGuire, claimed the fight would end in the sixth round with Simon flat on his back.

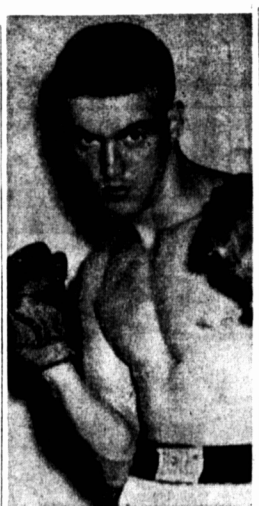
Seldom before have two fighters appeared as anxious to meet one another as do Simon and Hall. For one thing the winner is taking the whole purse and for another both boxers are claiming to be the best middleweights in the Maritimes.

Last night Mickey McGuire predicted that his boy Hall could lick any middleweight in the Maritimes and tonight would give Simon a shave and a haircut before the fight ended.

Simon was easily confident. "I have knocked out two of Clem's Crowley's boys already in my career. I plan to run that string to three before I leave the Province," he stated.

"I have little fear of any Boston fighter," he continued. "I fought Melis who outclasses anybody in the Maritimes and he fought Chico Velaz. Melis was a perfect tune-up for this fight with Hall."

Aside from the predictions the fight should be a rousing battle. Simon and Hall are both fighters who love to fight on the offensive and their free swinging styles

should make them a natural to present one of the most rousing scraps ever seen here.

Mickey McGuire, a pretty shrewd judge of fighters, had a lot of good words for Don Trainor last night. McGuire sends Andrew Gonzalez against Trainor in the 10-round co-feature tonight and he's not selling Trainor short.

After laying down his cigarette McGuire cocked his fists and stated "This Trainor looks like a fighter. He got a good left. It bothers a fighter, just as it bothers Billy Mays here in July."

"How long has he been fighting?" he asked. Answering his own question he continued, "I would say about 15 pro fights. We expect a tough fight from him. And remember that can hurt you."

Sport Fishing Off Rustico Proving Popular

Deep sea fishing trips by P. E. I. Residents and Tourists around the shores of Prince Edward Island are becoming more popular each season. This sport not only provides a great deal of enjoyment and novelty to those who take them but also is an added source of revenue to many fishermen after the lobster season closes at the end of June and before the heavy fall fishing period begins. Most of the parties go out either in the morning or for afternoon trips and the charges by most fishermen are reasonable.

Practically all of those going after this type of sport fishing use light spinning rods and get a great thrill out of landing a mackerel or even the plentiful cod and, from now until the end of the season around the middle of October there is always the possibility of hooking a pollock which is a magnificent fighter and really gives the sport fisherman all he can handle on a rod. Pollock are a beautifully shaped fish and is generally supposed to be of the mackerel or tuna family and around our shore run in size from about four pounds to twenty pounds. Along the New England coast and around certain parts of Nova Scotia pollock fishing is extremely popular.
