Three Lancasters Leave S'ide For U.K. Today -Three 4-engine Lancaster aircraft leave Summerside this morning for the United Kingdom carrying the members of the specialist navigation course on one of their long-distance training flights.

The flight will be made under the operational command of W.C. H.A. Forbes, D.F.C., commanding officer of Central Navigation School at Summerside.

Flying Officer Ralph Emery, pilot of one of the aircraft will be in charge of the Lancasters and crews.

Flying Officer Harold Wannamaker and Flying Officer Bob Harvey are pilots of the other two aircraft.

It is expected that the flight will be made directly from Summerside to R.A.F. Station Shawbury, in England—the Central Navigation School of the Royal Air Force.

Among the R.A.F. stations they will be visiting are: Farnborough, the scene of world famous air shows each year; also R.A.F. Station Leeming in York, an R.C.A.F. station during the war, and it was here that some of the squadrons of Number 6 Bomber Command were stationed.

The men will also be visiting London on an inspection tour of industries and institutions associated with the science of navigation.

Returning by way of the Azores, the three aircraft are expected to arrive back at Summerside on March 25th.
