Contract Bridge

"SWING" HAND

A psychic bid in the following deal created a large "swing" in a team-of-four contest.

North dealer. North-South vulnerable.

♠ A J 4 2 ♠ A Q J 7 6 3

♥ A ♠ A ♠ 7 4 ♠ 7 6

♦ K 10 9 5 ♠ N ♠ ♠ K 9 8 2

♣ K 10 ♠ W E ♠ ♠ 9 8 7 5

♠ Q 8 6 3 ♠ S ♠ ♠ J 10 9

♠ Q 4 3 ♠ ♠ ♠ J 6 4 3 2

♠ 5 ♠ ♠ ♠ A K 5 2

This was the bidding when the board was played for the first time:

Bridge bidding table with columns for North, East, South, West and rows for 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th bids.

East led the club jack, and North went down one, having to lose two hearts and two spades.

At the other table the bidding took a different turn:

West opened the diamond king. Declarer entered his hand with a club and took a heart finesse.

East won and led back a diamond, wanting to shorten dummy's trumps so that South could not use dummy as the "master" hand.

Dummy ruffed, and South discarded his two low clubs on the ace and queen of hearts.

West trumped in and forced dummy again in trumps by laying down the diamond queen.

Declarer, however, was equal to this attack. He ruffed a heart, and though West overruled, he now could do no better than to lead a club.

South won in his own hand, finessed against West's spade king, and after drawing trumps could claim the balance with good hearts.

No bridge writer likes to give public approval to psychic bids, but there was quite a bit of logic in South's spade response.

Certainly, there is no denying that the four-spade contract was superior to the four-heart contract.

Actually, as the cards lay, three notrump would have been easy, but a slightly different position of key cards would have had a fatal effect.
