enues by about \$ 30,000. Dr. James said this is only half the amount needed to balance the budget after the salary and student assistance increases go into effect.

The increase in teaching salaries is the first since June, 1953. The new scale provides a minimum salary of \$3,500 for lecturers, \$5,000 for associate professors, \$6,500 for associate professors and \$8,000 for professors.

This represents a \$2,000 increase for professors, \$1,500 for associate professors, \$1,000 for assistant professors and \$400 for lecturers.

Annual fees for arts, science, commerce and law students will be boosted to \$450 a session, increases of \$85, \$90, and \$59 respectively. Fees for engineering students were increased to \$550 from \$466 for medical students to \$650 from \$592 and for dentistry students to \$550 from \$515.

## Businessmen Told To Shape International Thinking

TORONTO (CP) — Canadian businessmen might take a greater part in shaping the thinking of international business organizations, R. C. Berklinshaw of Toronto, president of the Canadian council of the International Chamber of Commerce, suggested Thursday.

Addressing the council's annual meeting, Mr. Berklinshaw commented: "While, outwardly, the result of the chamber's work may take the form of resolutions and policy statements and from time to time result in adoption of legislation and treaties embodying policies which it has encouraged, there is a deeper significance in the fact that it forms a vehicle by which leading men in member countries can work together towards solving the many and varied economic problems of the day."

Mr. Berklinshaw was re-elected president of the Canadian council for his fourth term, and he said his experience had convinced him that the international chamber's work is sound, constructive and productive of worthwhile results.

At meetings at international headquarters in Paris the Canadian point of view was sought, given due weight and highly re-

spected. Accordingly, Canadians should not be hesitant in expressing their sentiments.

Events in Hungary and the Middle East had made the international situation uncertain politically, Mr. Berklinshaw said.

On the economic side, however, there were signs of definite progress.

**FAVORS MARKET PLAN**  
International trade continued at a high rate.

Agreement to form a "common market" in Europe augured well for future strengthening of the European economy and would probably have desirable political effects.

Imminent establishment of the Federation of the British West Indies should have a stimulating effect on the economy of the Caribbean area.

On the minus side of the ledger, the organization for trade co-operation had not yet come into being and Mr. Berklinshaw hoped the climate for it would be more favorable this year. It was designed to correlate, co-ordinate and provide continuity for activities under the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade and thus bring about a goods and services among countries.

Carl Bergthorn general manager of the council, said the Canadian delegation to the congress of the international chamber in Naples in May will consist of 38 delegates and 33 accompanying persons, for a total representation of 71—the largest Canadian representation to a congress since the chamber was formed in 1919.

## N. B. Official Opposition Is Reduced By One To 13

FREDERICTON (CP)—Sorrow, surprise and unanswered questions marked the opening of the 43rd New Brunswick legislature here Thursday.

It was one of the most unusual opening days in the 173-year history of the 52-member lawmaking body. When the first session ended, little was known of the government's plans for the weeks ahead.

W. J. (Tony) Gallant, re-elected during last June's general election as one of three Liberal members for Northumberland county, announced shortly after the legislature swore allegiance to the Queen Thursday morning that he would not sit with the Opposition.

"I am a Liberal," he told reporters. "The others are independents." His announcement left Liberal Leader J. E. Connolly with only 13 opposition members against 36 Progressive Conservatives headed by Premier Hugh John Flemming. Two seats are vacant.

**MINISTER MOURNED**  
The throne speech was read by

Chief Justice J. B. McNair of the New Brunswick Supreme Court who reigned as Liberal premier of the province from 1940 to 1952.

Like other formal speeches made during the two-hour session, it dwelt upon the loss of Municipal Affairs Minister T. Babbitt Parlee who disappeared with two companions aboard a private plane last month.

What happens to the Moncton city seat left empty by Mr. Parlee's disappearance is still to be answered by the government.

Only proof of death or special legislation allows the government to declare the seat vacant and call a by-election. And only Lieutenant-Governor D. L. MacLaren, who missed the legislature opening for the first time in 12 years through illness, can vacate Mr. Parlee's portfolio and presidency of the executive council.

**DOG SEARCH OFF**  
MONTREAL (CP)—Search for a wild German shepherd dog off Mount Royal, has been called off by police and SPCA officials because they will make it so nervous they will never catch it.

The dog, believed to be a valuable thoroughbred which escaped from Montreal Airport last fall, has been chasing skiers and howling at people walking on the mountain.
