MARITIME COLT STAKES.—The Halifax Recorder says: "Although Charlottetown was the highest, Halifax being most central, and there being such a slight difference in the amount offered, the tender was awarded to Halifax, under the clause of the conditions which says, in awarding tenders, the central port of the track, with amount offered, and position of entries, will be considered, and the entry on the last payments made include 22 from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and 11 from the Island, while the difference between the two provinces is 11. The tender from New Brunswick, 5 from P. E. Island and 14 from Nova Scotia."
