BAND and good ice at the Rink to-night.

The mails are crossing from both Capes to-day. The couriers will arrive in Charlotte town early this evening.

The banking house of Charles A. Sweet & Co., of Boston, has failed with liabilities estimated at two or three millions.

The house of John Knoddell, of Gay's River, near Shubenacadie, N. S., was burned on Monday night. Mr. Knoddell's eldest son perished in the flames.

HANLAN has sent a cablegram to Wallace Ross, asking him to row on the Thames for the Sportsman cup, and Ross has replied that he would.

At a recent meeting of the Marine Board, held in Halifax, Mr. John Nicholson, of P. E. Island, passed a creditable examination and received a master's certificate.

The Halifax Herald says:—"There are at present in Rockhead sixteen male and seven female prisoners—the smallest number in the history of the Institution."

SMELTS.—Twelve hundred tons of smelts were shipped from Miramichi, N. B., during the present winter, and nearly four hundred tons from Kent County, N. B.

MR. JONES TURNBULL, the new manager of the Halifax sugar refinery, has arrived in the "Parisian" from Liverpool. He has had a large experience in a like establishment in Scotland.

SOME people seem to have been born to "fail." The Monetary Times notes the case of P. E. Labelle, Montreal, who has failed three times since 1859, and is now liquidating at 40 cents on the dollar.

HON. MR. SULLIVAN has given notice of an address of congratulation to be forwarded to Her Majesty the Queen, on the escape of Her Majesty from danger, and the attempt recently made upon her life.

An unfortunate Austrian sailor is wandering about the streets of this city. He is altogether friendless and without any means of support. The Austrian Consul should be advised of this poor man's condition.

REV. THADDEUS SALTERS, the first colored man ever admitted to the Ministry of the Protestant Episcopal Church of South Carolina, was ordained by Bishop Howe at Charleston, on the 3rd inst.

An astrologer in Nevada prophesies, and backs up his prediction with a wager of an oyster supper, that some monarch now reigning in Europe will die during the month of March.

MR. THOMAS WHITE, M. P., has received the hearty endorsement and re-nomination of the Liberal Conservatives of Cardwell. Our friends all over the country are taking to the work of political organization as if they meant business.

AN interesting Missionary Meeting was held at North River, on Tuesday, the 7th inst. Revs. D. G. McDonald, M. Ross and W. B. Bradshaw, were present; and upwards of \$60 were subscribed for Missionary purposes.

A DEPUTATION representing thousands of unemployed persons in London, England, waited on the Lord Mayor to ask advice and aid, especially as regards emigrants. The Mayor advises them to confer with Sir Alexander T. Galt, High Commissioner for Canada.

THE "Canada Gazette" contains the appointment of Richardson Borradaile, District Inspector of Inland Revenue for Nova Scotia and P. E. Island, to be a commissioner to administer the necessary oaths to persons holding offices in Nova Scotia and P. E. Island.

BRANDON, Manitoba, could have been bought for a few hundred dollars last winter. But "within the past nine months Brandon property has changed hands to the amount of \$2,500,000." The Brandon Sun says \$200,000 worth of property changed hands in one day recently—and that a hard winter's day.

THE warehouse of Owen Connolly, Esq., on Connolly's Wharf, was broken into last night, and a barrel of flour stolen therefrom. It was taken to a schooner near the wharf, and then emptied into a box, which was hauled to the house of Mrs. Peardon at the south end of the city. Mrs. Peardon's son, George, has been arrested in connection with the robbery.

AT Freetown, on Friday night last, a house of bad reputation, inhabited by a widow and her daughter, was raided by some neighbors. The occupants were ordered out, the utensils removed to the top of the snow-bank hard by; and then two bundles of straw were brought in, and a match lit.

THE Committee appointed to enquire into the best means of keeping up communication between this Island and the Mainland, winter and summer, are prepared with their report. They have, therefore, asked the Mayor to convene the adjourned meeting of citizens, to take the matter under consideration. The meeting will be held on Saturday.

A TERRIBLE LOSS.—The Gloucester, Mass., schooner "Edith M. Pow," "Paul Revere," and "Charles Carroll," which were fishing on George's Banks, and the "Bessie M. Somes," on Grand Banks, are missing. It is supposed they were lost in the great gale of the 5th ult. By the loss of these four vessels 53 men were lost, who leave 27 widows and 66 fatherless children.

PROF. FLETCHER'S lecture, in aid of the Christian Baptist Church building fund, delivered on Tuesday evening at Montague Bridge, was very successful. An able lecture in Prof. F.'s best style, large audience, perfect order, and satisfactory financial results. Duncan McDonald, Esq., presided. His address was brief and to the point. An unanimous vote of thanks to the lecturer closed an enjoyable evening. The many friends of Prof. Fletcher will always welcome him in this section of the country.

ARTEMAS LORD, Esq., Agent of the Marine and Fisheries, returned from the "Northern Light" to-day. He boarded the steamer yesterday and reports her safe in the ice, four miles from Cape Sharp. Capt. Mutch, with a number of the officers of the boat, arrived at Cape Sharp—seven miles from Georgetown—this morning. The party left immediately for Georgetown, having in charge the Express Goods, which may be expected by to-morrow morning's train.

EUROPE has one more King in the person of William II., of Servia.

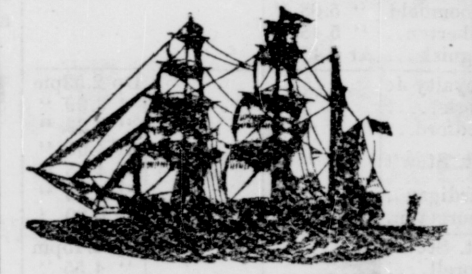

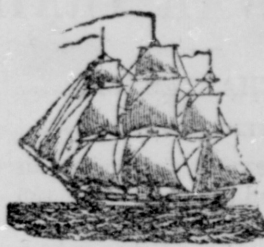
