Editorial Notes.

Hackett's speech in THE EXAMINER is not the one reported in the Hansard.

This important announcement is telegraphed from Ottawa to the Patriot. We have only to say that Mr. Hackett's speech, as reported in THE EXAMINER, was clipped from a trial sheet of the Hansard sent to this office; and, with the exception of a few minor errors, which were evidently reportorial or typographical, and the insertion of some head lines, it is, we believe, just as it appears in Hansard. If we misprinted Mr. Hackett's speech we did so unintentionally, and would be glad to correct any mistake worth correcting.

By the way, on comparing the Hansard report of Mr. Davies' speech with a pamphlet entitled, in large black letters, "Speech of Mr. Davies, M. P.," which is being circulated, we note some striking alterations, amendments and additions. In fact the whole thing has been revised, polished up, and made readable.

The weakness of our opponents on the finance question is being constantly demonstrated. To make up a good big load of taxation, the Patriot piles on the earnings of our Railways, Canals, Post Offices, etc.; and in making a comparison of the results of Grit and Tory managements, it conveniently leaves out of the count the deficits under Cartwright while it adds in the surpluses under Tilley. Everyone, by his own experience, knows that earnings is not taxation; and what man is there among the Grits—except the editor of the Patriot—who will call the surplus he has in hand at the end of the year, by reason of the activity and expansion of his business, a burden? But neither of these blunders is so gross as that of the correspondent of the Patriot of last evening. To prove that a statement of THE EXAMINER made last June—concerning the Customs revenue contributed by this Province in 1881 is incorrect, this rational gentleman adds together the Customs and Excise paid last year, by the Province; and asks triumphantly, what confidence can be placed in any financial statement that appears in THE EXAMINER?

Dr. Clay, Dominion Immigration Agent at Halifax, advises all railway men to stop drinking. He says:—"Would to God that every Railroad man in our Dominion would have seen the funeral of the late much lamented John Murray, train master at North Street station, and they would have seen how a workman's character is appreciated by both high and low, when it can be said, as was said of him, 'A good man has fallen, pure in his language, truthful in his statements, honest in his dealings, temperate in his habits, faithful to his religion, a kind husband and affectionate father, a pattern worthy of the best Railwayman's imitation.'" For he was followed to the grave by a mile of mourning friends embracing every class from the green hand at the brake to the rich merchant and the Governor of the Province. Let me again urge upon the young men of the I. C. R. to dash down the intoxicating cup. There is death in it—death to all earthly success, death to both soul and body, and perhaps in your case it might prove to be death to many others placed under your care. I should not have taken the time and trouble to have written the above if I had not felt that the men of the I. C. R. hold a very high place in my esteem, and a very warm place in my affections."

For the last few weeks the Patriot has been chanting the praises of Mr. L. H. Davies. According to that organ, Mr. Davies is not only an able debater and brilliant speaker, but a great acquisition generally to the ranks of the Opposition. The Patriot would have people believe that Mr. D. is carrying everything before him, at Ottawa, by storm. All other Island members, past and present, sink into utter insignificance, in the eyes of the Patriot editor, when compared with the matchless orator from Queen's. It is said of Pericles that his eloquence was so powerful, that like thunder, he shook and astonished all Greece,—his art of uniting force and beauty so great that there was no resisting the strength of his arguments or the sweetness of his delivery. One would imagine from reading the Patriot, that a greater than Pericles has arisen at the Capital, and that henceforth all who are so obtuse as not to bestow upon the wonderful man both admiration and praise, may expect to be ranked among the vilest of public detractors. For our part, we have no wish to detract from Mr. Davies' reputation as an active politician and fluent speaker. But in common justice to others, whom the Patriot is constantly trying to belittle and misrepresent, we have to say that the extraordinary statements made concerning him, of late, by the editor of the Patriot are not borne out by the facts. Mr. Davis' maiden speech in the House of Commons, was anything but a success. Mr. Hackett, in reply, proved more than a match for him, as our readers may see for themselves by reading their respective speeches. The truth is Mr. Davies is not looked upon by either party at Ottawa as a success. He has not yet won his spurs; and the silence of the Globe and Montreal Herald, the two leading Reform journals, is ominous, to say the least. As leader of the Island contingent, he may succeed tolerably well—as Yeo and McIntyre will follow their party through thick and thin. If, however, he leads his two faithful followers as recklessly as he led his party on this Island, not long ago, political disaster is sure to overtake both him and them at no distant day.

Who are We to Believe?

In the Patriot of March 1st, a writer, who appears to be a Grit of the more advanced class, says:—"Where will you find another one hundred thousand people in Canada, who are better off than the people of this Island? I am sure it is not in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick or Quebec."

In the House of Commons the other day Mr. Davies referred to the Island as that "unfortunate Province," declaring that the N. P. has worked upon agricultural communities nothing but ruin and desolation. In the country parts he said (we quote his exact words) "whole settlements have left the place!"

Dr. McIntyre followed, re-echoing the statements of his leader. Farmers, according to him, were never worse off in the recollection of himself or the oldest inhabitant. They were in a most miserable state altogether, he said, many of them being in a state of misery and poverty.

Now, which of the above three authorities are people expected to believe? Perhaps, the "genius" of the Patriot may be able to reconcile the conflicting statements of his friends!

This depreciation of the Province by the Representatives of the Province, must have a bad effect upon the credit of the Province. Merchants in Montreal or Toronto, or New York, who know not the proneness of Mr. Davies, Dr. McIntyre, & Co., to rash and unfounded statements, will be very apt, on reading their speeches, to require a very large margin and ample security for goods sent here, or, perhaps, to shut down on us altogether. No one can possibly tell what damage Mr. Davies and Dr. McIntyre have done the merchants and people of this Province.

Awake! Get Up!!

The people of Prince Edward Island—the farmers especially—do not seem to be awake to the fact that one of the most terrible scourges that ever visited the Island is now at their doors, in their midst, in their fields.

We refer to the Colorado Beetle, the dreaded Potatoe Bug—that pest which for years has been ravaging the potatoe fields of the Continent, and which has cost the farmers, throughout the potatoe raising regions of the United States and the British Provinces, millions of dollars in time and materials in endeavoring to subdue or mitigate its ravages, and other millions in the loss of crops.

From the evidence gathered last season there is every reason to believe that the enemy is upon us. But we feel sure that the bug is not so firmly fixed but that it cannot be exterminated—stamped out—by a determined effort. If measures are not adopted to destroy the bug during the coming season, the terrible scourge will become so fastened upon us, that its ravages will surely continue for years, and the loss to our farmers be of enormous proportions.

It is useless to waste time speculating upon how the beetle got here. With the Straits as a barrier to prevent great and continuous invasions by the great potato bug armies, the Island is so situated as to be able to successfully combat and exterminate the pest, provided vigilant, intelligent efforts are put forth. We would suggest that meetings be called in every neighborhood on the Island, funds subscribed, and measures taken to destroy the bug by fire on every spot where it shall appear. Every plot of potatoes upon which the bug shall put in an appearance should be covered with straw, saturated with kerosene oil, and set on fire. This would of course destroy the crop, but the dreadful bug, in all its stages of development, would be effectually destroyed also. The owner—should be paid for his crop—the worth of which might be determined by valuers. We believe that \$2,000 might easily be raised by subscription in each County, and that that sum—\$6,000—would be amply sufficient to do the work the coming season. Should measures not be adopted at once, and the bug permitted to do its work next season unmolested, then each individual farmer will be compelled to fight the enemy as best he may, "on his own hook."

We know of one enterprising firm which has already imported a quantity of Paris Green, in anticipation of the coming demand. This little incident should show the farmers how intelligent men, who have watched the ravages of the bug in the neighboring Provinces, view the subject. Let the bug once get a firm foothold here, and then farmers must buy liberally of Paris Green and London Green wherewith to fight the pest; and then will commence the long struggle between the farmer and the bug, as to which shall secure the greater share of our future potato crops.

Supreme Court—Georgetown.

The Queen vs Joseph Campbell. The prisoner was tried for assaulting and interfering with a constable while in discharge of his duty. The trial was finished yesterday, and the jury looking at, and taking into consideration the custom of the country, found the prisoner not guilty, and he was thereupon discharged.

A few years ago Capt. Boycott had to be escorted by a strong military force from his house to the railway station on his way to England. He made a visit to America, and, finding no place like home, returned to his boycotted house and set about the work of making his peace with the people. He went at it earnestly and with such honest intention that he is now free to go where he pleases without police protection.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

The Court of Railway Commissioners.

OTTAWA, March 9. Mr. Dalton McCarthy's Act for constituting a Court of Railway Commissioners for Canada, and to amend the Consolidated Railway Act of 1879, was, yesterday, referred to the Committee on Railways. It enacts that the Court to be constituted shall have power to deal with the disputes which frequently arise between municipalities and railway companies, respecting the crossing of roads and streets and the location of roads and streets across the tracks of such railways, and the manner of such crossings, and the terms and conditions applicable thereto; also, as to the alignment, arrangement, disposition and limitation of tracks within such municipalities; also as to the compensation payable by railway companies for lands taken or occupied by them, in which lands such municipalities are interested or in respect of which they claim compensation; also respecting laws passed by municipalities in aid of railways and agreements made in relation thereto; and also disputes which frequently arise between railway companies themselves as to traffic arrangements, the adjustment of rates for passengers and freight, crossing of tracks and compensation therefor, including cost of maintenance, the alignment, arrangement, disposition and location of tracks; rights of way over or through lands owned or occupied by railway companies; running powers; haulage; use of tracks; use of stations and station grounds; adjustment of tables; transhipment and interchange of freight and other matters relating to "powers," "highways and bridges," and "traffic arrangements."

LONDON, March 8. A despatch from Bombay states that floods have done much damage in that vicinity.

DUBLIN, March 9. Miss Florence Dixie has sued Mr. Biggar, M. P., for breach of promise. She places the damage at £400 sterling.

DUBLIN, March 9. Writs have been issued against Messrs. Parnell and Biggar, charging them with a net accounting for one hundred and fifty thousand pounds of the Irish National Land League funds.

Scott Act Statistics.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE EXAMINER. DEAR SIR,—The following facts taken from the Customs Returns for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1882, shows that, notwithstanding the existence of the Scott Act, there is a large quantity of liquor imported and consumed in this Province. In brandy, gin, rum and whiskey alone, there was entered for home consumption during the fiscal year, above named, as follows: total number of gallons 39,075; value \$82,150.00, duty paid thereon \$52,575.53. To this may be added the large quantity of liquor received from Montreal, Halifax, St. John, Pictou and other places, by those in the community who are in a position thus to order their supplies from abroad, rather than run the risk of exposure by purchasing at home. These statements show the great necessity that exists for energetic action on the part of temperance men and women, and organizations such as the Dominion Temperance Alliance, Sons of Temperance, &c., whose object is the suppression of intemperance.

A serious complaint is recorded against the barometer by M. Henri de Parville in the French Journal Officiel. He says that this little instrument has lost the respect of a great number of people. On all sides it is exclaimed that the thing is radically wrong, that it no longer knows what it says, and has entirely ceased to be trustworthy. Scarcely has the mercury risen, when the rain begins to descend, and when the mercury falls the sun shines. M. de Parville admits that appearances are against the instrument, but claims that the barometer is still the most precious appliance we possess for the study of atmospheric phenomena. In studying the barometer the question of altitude is an important factor. An instrument hung in a town 1,500 feet from the level of the sea would show a pressure of 40 millimetres less than one hung on the sea level, and while the latter would point to "variable," in the former it would persistently point to "much rain," although the sun might in the meanwhile be shining brightly. With an allowance for this difference of pressure dependent upon varying altitudes, the barometer may still be relied upon as trustworthy.
