THE TRICK WORKED.—Miss Mollie Westphall, of Syracuse, N. Y., has been engaged to a Thomas Rand, of the same place, for some time past. On Wednesday afternoon, she saw him chatting with a lady friend on the street, and she went to her home and took a dose of laudanum. Her life was despaired of. Rand was sent for. Her father denounced him as a murderer. After four hours Miss Westphall regained consciousness, and at ten o'clock she and Rand were married. The following day the young woman was herself again.

FATALITY AT NEW GLASGOW, N. S.—A sad accident occurred at New Glasgow, N. S., on Wednesday, by which an elderly man named Wm. Love, lost his life, while engaged in ploughing with a pair of horses, one of them being unbroken. The horses turned rapidly and one of them put his feet on Love's breast and injured him so severely that he lived but half an hour. The deceased was a miner, and has had several narrow escapes. During an accident at the Vale he was waiting at the pit mouth to go down on the next rake, when an explosion occurred. This made him decide to abandon mining and live on his farm, but even there a violent death overtook him.

ANOTHER FIRE.—Shortly before five o'clock yesterday afternoon an alarm was sent in for a fire in Mr. George Bremner's stable, situate in the rear of his residence, Prince street. The fire was accidental, and was caused by a 5 year old child playing with matches near some dry chips and straw piled against the stable. The flames from the chips and straw found their way up to the left through an open door, and set fire to the hay therein. Through the exertions of some citizens who were early on the scene, the fire was kept down until the arrival of the firemen who extinguished the flames before much damage was done. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Disastrous Fire. HAVANA, May 18. Fire broke out last night in Sasi's hardware store and soon reached a barrel of powder in the building, causing a terrific explosion. The whole structure was blown to pieces and 22 persons were killed. Among the dead are four fire chiefs and the Venezuelan Consul. In addition to the killed over 100 persons were injured. Several houses adjacent were damaged by the explosion.

The Wrong Medicine. HALIFAX, May 19. Duncan Campbell, of Salmon River, Truro, a respectable farmer, about 70 years of age, died under unusual circumstances. He was under medical treatment, and was using two bottles of medicine, one inwardly and the other for external application. By mistake, he took a dose of the medicine which was to be applied externally, and died from the effects.

Obituary. MONTREAL, May 18. Joseph J. Loranger, Q. C., brother of Judge Loranger, of the Supreme Court and of the late Hon. Thomas Loranger, died yesterday morning after a short illness.

MONTREAL, May 19. Francis McCulloch, sub-chief of the fire department, died quite suddenly this morning while preparing to go to church. He had been in the department since 1849, and was a very able official.

Mr. Mercier Retires. ST. HYACINTHE, May 18. Hon. H. Mercier has retired from this constituency. Mr. Desmarais, his late law partner, being nominated yesterday in the Government interest. The Premier will either contest Quebec County or Bonaventure.

The Question of Sewerage. SIR,—I was much pleased with your leading article in THE EXAMINER of Friday last on the subject of sewerage. The time is not any too soon to face this grave question and endeavor to meet it manfully. The mephitic exhalations from sluggish drains and stagnant cesspools will not sound any alarm. They will, nevertheless, spread death and mourning none the less surely that they do it silently. The suggestion to the City Council to co-operate with the Local Government in procuring proper plans is very simple, and need not prove expensive. As a ratepayer, I would strongly urge upon them to lose no time. To my fellow-citizens I wish to say, they will never probably have a better chance of obtaining plans and estimates by a competent sanitary engineer than by co-operating with the Local Government, as suggested by you. SIR,—Every well wisher of the city must be pleased to know that the suggestion you made a short time ago to appoint an acting sanitary officer during Mr. McRae's illness has been adopted by the City Council, and that they have appointed City Marshal Cameron to discharge this duty. Now that Mr. Cameron is appointed it will be in order for him to inspect all yards and water closets at once, and to prosecute all who do not have their premises thoroughly cleaned in compliance with our sanitary regulations. The police are, of course, bound to assist him in the discharge of this duty, and we have no doubt that both the Marshal and police will do their duty in this respect promptly and energetically. The public will expect this of them.
