Blight Situation Said Unchanged

The weekly potato blight bulletin for Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia issued by the Research Laboratory in Charlottetown says there is no sign of improvement in the blight situation.

It says the weather has continued to be favorable for the development and spread of late blight.

It continues: "September is usually the month in which the potato grower is confronted with the most difficult disease control problem. In this region, September weather conditions are likely to be conducive to the advance of late blight on the foliage and to the inoculation of the tubers."

"Growers of main crop potatoes should anticipate a short-interval spray schedule from now until the end of the season and they should plan to terminate the program with a top killer," the bulletin states.

"Aphids and flea beetles have increased greatly during the past ten days especially in the western part of Prince Edward Island. Malathion will effectively control aphids and to some extent flea beetles. If however DDT population is high DDT should be added to the spray," the bulletin warns.

The bulletin was prepared by F.M. Cannon and L.C. Callbeck of the Research Laboratory.

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P.E.I.-Bred Yorkshires Top Ottawa Exhibition

The supremacy of Island Yorkshires, demonstrated on many previous occasions, was again brought into prominence when the swine herd of Colonel C.C. Reeves of Bath, Ontario, won all six top prizes for Yorkshires at the Central Canadian Exhibition in Ottawa.

Colonel Reeves who came from England about 10 years ago wanted to get started right in Canadian farming so he enrolled in a two year course in general agriculture at Ontario Agricultural College.

The next important step he made was to purchase a number of Island Yorkshire sows and boars which became the foundation of his herd. He has added to these with periodic purchases from Prince Edward Island.

Last year he purchased a year old boar from Elmer Paynter of French River named Paynter Laddie. Col. Reeves took the young boar to the Central and Royal fairs and walked off with the grand championship.

Paynter Laddie is out of a sow which was bred and raised by N.W. MacLeod and Sons, Dundas. The sow in 1957 won a silver tray for being the highest scoring sow in Canada with a mark of 94.

Colonel Reeves is proud of the fact that his swine herd is 100 percent P.E.I. Yorkshire and in his advertising which he carries extensively in most farm magazines he uses the caption—"P.E.I. Yorkshire herd in Ontario."

In 1958 he had the two highest scoring sows in Ontario and in 1957 and 1958 had the most champion bacon hogs and carcasses at the Guelph field day. These prize carcasses were from a boar raised by Rowell Boswell at Frenchfort.

Commenting on Colonel Reeves' achievement, senior livestock fieldman, Harold W. Clay said yesterday Ontario breeders have been inclined to minimize the standing of Island Yorkshires in Ontario but he noted, "the facts speak for themselves."

O'Leary Teachers Suggest Phonics, Sight Be Combined

The annual local teachers convention of O'Leary and surrounding districts met in the high school yesterday with the president Robert A. Grindlay presiding and an attendance of 59 teachers.

Ralph Gaudet presented the resolutions which were adopted at the afternoon session.

The teachers were then formed into groups for a discussion period on the following topics: Teaching of phonics, what to do with slow and brilliant learners, proposed changes in the science tests. The findings of the groups were as follows: that phonics and sight be combined in the teaching of reading, and guide books be used in teaching phonics, that teaching be for pupils of average ability, the establishing of larger units, extra curricula for the brilliant child, and grouping pupils according to ability.

Donald MacLean, a member of the science committee, introduced the new science text. He pointed out several reasons for choosing this book which will be on the course next year. Millar MacFadyen distributed material relative to teaching.

Mrs. Marie Devlin, director of Junior Red Cross, urged the teachers to promote international friendship and understanding by studying language using the albums exchange, magazine exchange and tape recordings.

The resolutions committee extended thanks to the O'Leary School Board for the use of their school and to all who helped make the convention a success.

The nominating committee brought in the following slate of officers: President, Robert A.

Grindlay (re-elected); vice-president, Mrs. Mary Sharp; secretary, Mrs. Blanche Crockett.

In welcoming Miss Anna Riley as the general secretary of the P.E.I. Teachers Federation, Mr. Grindlay also paid tribute to the retiring secretary, Miss Estelle Bowness, who worked so unflinchingly on behalf of the teachers.

Miss Riley also welcomed the new teachers and outlined various topics of interest to teachers.

Merrill E. Callaghan, supervisor of schools, conducted a question and answer period when many of the problems of teachers were discussed.

Malcolm MacKenzie, director of education, spoke to teachers on the curriculum, summer school courses and urged teachers to improve their class of licenses.

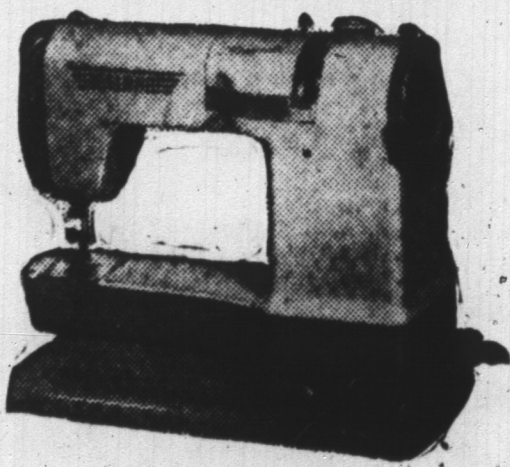
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
