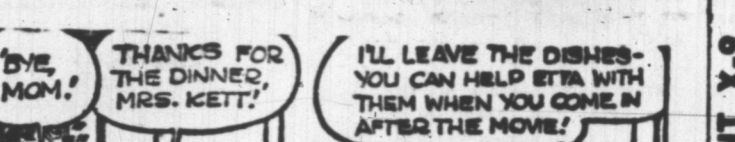

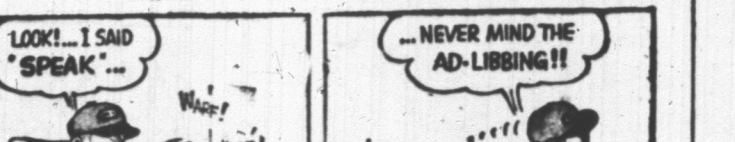
DAILY CRYPTOQUOTE
