

Court Comments On Increase In Drunken Driving

Chief Justice T. A. Campbell in Supreme Court yesterday commented to the Grand Jury on the "alarming number" of cases of drunken driving during the first five months of the year during which there were 16 prisoners in custody at the Queen's County Jail charged with this offence.

In his address to the jury at the opening of the June sittings, the Chief Justice, who was alone on the Bench, stated there had been a total of 142 prisoners in custody from January 1 to June 1 this year. They were there on a variety of charges he said, but over 100 were for offences concerning liquor.

"If they were eliminated the County would have a good five months' record," he stated, adding that there were entirely too many intoxicated drivers. There is no excuse in the eyes of the law for driving motor vehicles while under the influence of intoxicating beverages.

A breakdown of the charges under which the prisoners had been sent to jail showed: drunk and incapable, 65; drunk and disorderly, 21; drunken driving, 16; offences against the Temperance Act, 3; vagrancy, 17; damage to private property, 2; breaking and entering, 3; non support, 1; theft, 3; possession of stolen goods, 4; false pretences, 2; forgery, 1; manslaughter, 1; failing to file income tax form T1 General; 1; intimidation, 1; abusive language, 1.

He said the report showed there were 29 prisoners in custody at the jail at the present time.

Fatal Accidents

The Chief Justice spoke of the alarming number of fatal accidents in the past two months, but said the majority had not been proceeded with in the Supreme Court. He said this leads us in a general way to analyze the causes. He mentioned one causing the death of a child where a wheel came off a car. This was as near as one could come to a pure accident and the only remedy possible would be more frequent checkups.

In discussing other accidents involving the death of children he said those who had read the cases and studied the evidence were satisfied that no blame attached to the drivers. There might be some blame attached to the children in some cases but the only answer to that was greater care and control of the children especially in heavy traffic areas. A dangerous position was created by children alighting from one vehicle to be hit by another. Drivers of vehicles carrying children should be very careful to see that children are not allowed to cross a road if there is traffic coming.

Mentioning recent accidents causing death when motor vehicles collided with trains he said there was much talk about highway or railway authorities doing something. But in these cases there was nothing the railway or any other authority could do to prevent them as they occurred at open crossings and apparently the drivers of the vehicles had assumed there would be no trains. The best plan, he stated, was always to assume there would be a train. The real safety measures required, was on the part of all drivers themselves.

Retail prices to consumers have not yet been adjusted and present paying prices are AL 69-71, AM 68, AP 55-8, B 65.

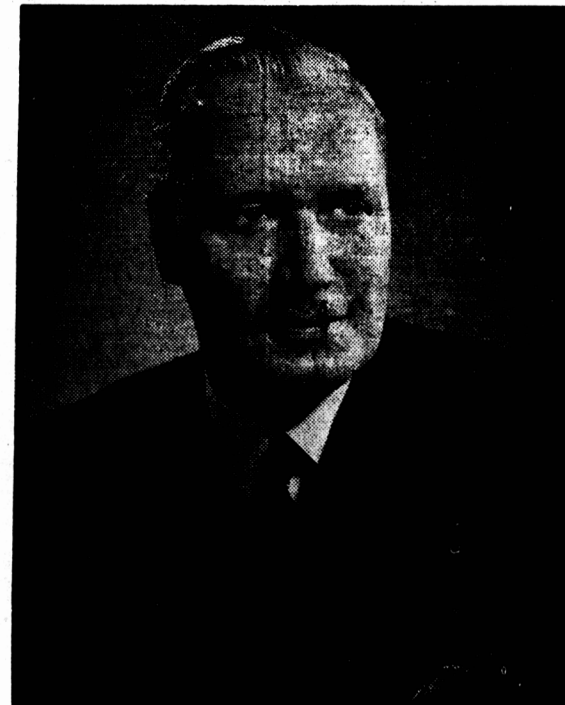
