Shaw responded, giving an interesting address on the founding of the order and its growth throughout the world until today. It is the largest fraternal organization in the world. The toast to the rebekahs and lady guests was proposed by Mr. Archie Hiltchey and was responded to by the Noble Grand of Acme, Mrs. Frances Shaw. Miss Alvah Brehaut, by special request, read a historical account of the institution and growth of CME Rebekah Lodge in Montague. Mrs. Brehaut prepared and read the address at the recently celebrated 41st anniversary of the institution of the local lodge. King's County Fishermen Ready For Season Opening

At high noon today lobstermen will be run marking the beginning of another two-month season. Although the season begins officially on May 1, fishermen are permitted to run their lines today. Some few will undoubtedly set traps and the first lobsters will hit the market on Monday. However the first big haul will not be made until Tuesday or Wednesday, after all traps are set. Countless hundreds of traps are ready all along the north, east and south-east shores in preparation for the full trap setting on Monday. Boats will set out today from Wood Island, Little Sands, Beach Point, Murray Harbor, Casperetuck, Sturgeon, Panmure Island, Lower Marsh, Launching, Annandale, Fortune, Souris, South Lake, North Lake, and all along the north shore. Over 100 boats will set out from the south-east shore line to fish on fishermen's bank, Pictou Island and inshore. Another 150 boats will move out of Georgetown area to fish from Panmure Island, Middle Ground, West End Ground and Launching Ground. 282 boats will move out from Annandale, Fortune, Souris, Basin Head, North Lake, Naurage, Red Head (Morell), and Savage Harbor. The average trap fleet will be 280 to 300, but several fishermen are running 400 to 500 traps. In all about 140,000 traps will be laid. The fishing factories along the coast line are ready for the first haul, and have been preparing for the season for the past month. Barring the advent of contrary winds, the fishermen anticipate no difficulty in running their lines today as the whole area is ice free, a factor which delayed the south east shore a considerable time a couple of years ago. There is no scarcity of bait as laden vessels have not stopped at all ports with sufficient for several weeks, and at the present time no shortage is anticipated. Last year the starting prices were 22 for canners and 25 for markets. Prices rose during the season and at the half way mark were 26 for canners and 30 for markets and at the end of the season were 28 for canners and 33 for markets. On the last day

An important item on the agenda was the initiation of eight new members. The solemn and impressive initiation ceremony was carried out with Art Hale acting as presenting officer.
