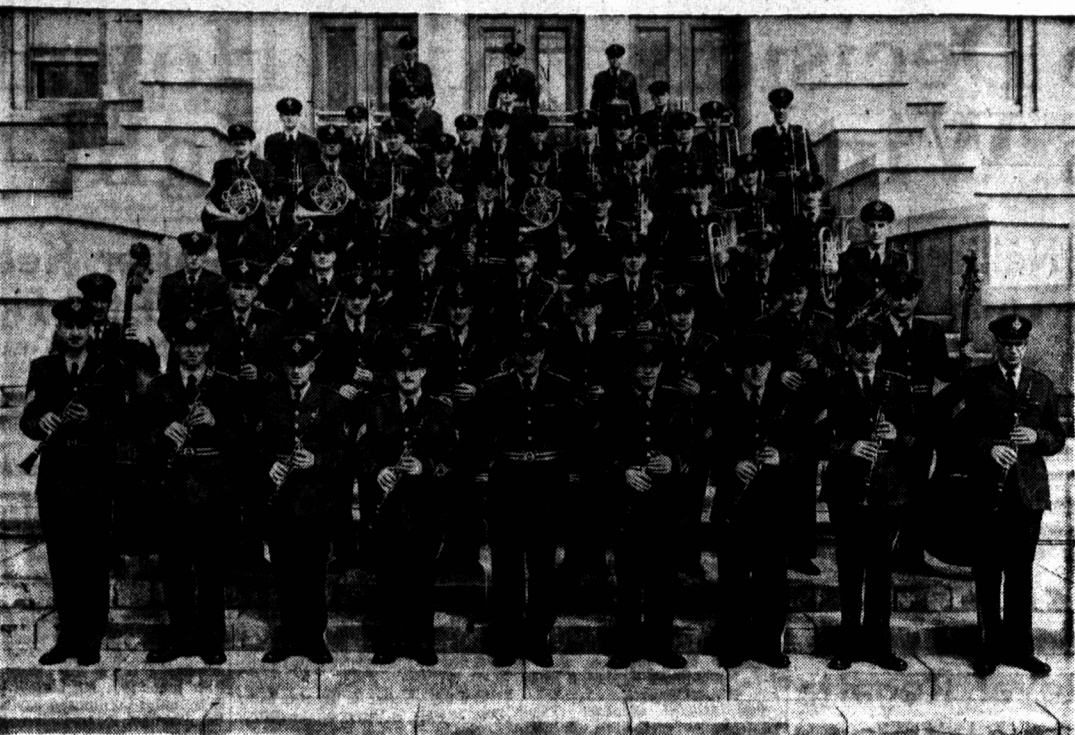

Famous Band Coming For Air Force Day In Charlottetown

Fifty-five of the finest musicians in Canada will present a concert on the afternoon of July 2nd, at 2.15 p.m. when the Central Band of the Royal Canadian Air Force visits Charlottetown. The band, under the direction of WO 1 Robbins, will play at the Charlottetown Airport as part of the Centennial Aviation show program. These musicians in air force blue have built an international reputation for fine music, not only of the military band variety. One of the big reasons for their popularity is their versatility. The Central Band is just as much at home playing popular or light con-

cert music as it is with conventional military marches. With special arrangements by Sgt. Ken Campbell and Cpl Pierre Regnier, the band's large musical repertoire includes many works previously not available to brass-band ensembles, as well as all the best known military music. The R.C.A.F. Central Band, probably the only band to play a concert at Times Square in New York City on Saturday night is particularly popular each year at the Central Canada Exhibition. The exhibition's general manager has described this organization as the "finest and most versatile on the North American continent

for tremendous quantities of food to feed the world—hence the importance of sea food, its proper inspection, grading etc. The need for increased interest on the part of research workers to preserve our fishing grounds and discover new ones. The cool waters around our Maritime shores produces a better quality of fish than elsewhere. Fishing is one of our greatest industries but the least understood and possibly the least educational program centered on it. To do a proper educational job for the fishermen and industry in general is a tremendous one. To quote Dr. Kaak of the Fisheries Council of Canada "In a changing world the challenge flung at fisheries is a real one."

FORESTRY AND WOODLOTS

The report on forestry and woodlots was given by Mr. Nelson Adams of the University of New Brunswick. He stated that forestry was the biggest industry of the Maritime Provinces and that it had a wonderful future. The net value of the forestry industry in the Maritimes last year was \$400,000,000. He predicted that the industry would be doubled by 1970 and urged the creation of farm woodlots. Miss Josephine Lynam of Fredericton, N.B., reported on education. Among the recommendations which she made were a study of community resources as part of our educational and adult educational programs; need of university trained teachers; study of successes and failures in the Maritimes; and a study of the principles of co-operation as well as private enterprise. The report on mining and heavy industry was given by Rev. George Topshie of St. Francis Xavier University and the report on National and Regional Economic Policies by Mr. O. N. Mann, Executive Secretary, Atlantic Provinces, Economic Council. Mr. Alex Laidlaw was chairman.

General Dynamics, Stromberg-Carlson Companies Merge

DOVER, Del. (AP)—The merger of General Dynamics Corporation, parent company of Canadair Ltd., largest Canadian aircraft manufacturer, and Stromberg-Carlson Company was approved Tuesday by stockholders of both concerns. Directors of both companies had approved the merger proposal April 25. John Jay Hopkins, chairman of the board and president of General Dynamics, announced Tuesday the merger following the vote of General Dynamics share owners in Dover. Stromberg-Carlson shareholders gave their approval in Rochester, N. Y. Tuesday. General Dynamics, with \$20,795,472 profits in 1954, builds submarines, airplanes and a wide range of military weapons. It constructed the first atomic submarine, the Nautilus, at Groton, Conn. Its Consolidated Vultee Aircraft division is a major producer of airplanes and missiles. Stromberg-Carlson, with \$1,981,754 earnings last year, manufactures telephone switchboards, home television, radio and record playing equipment and radio-phonograph instruments. It owns and operates at Rochester, N. Y., television station WHAM-TV and radio stations WHAM and WHFM.
