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Dr. J.A. MacMillan Discusses Health Services, Economies

"I would venture to predict that the year 1955 may possibly point the way to the beginning of a health service in Canada which may give leadership to the world. A wide expansion of voluntary health services in this country is underway.

The lack of assistance to the primary industry of agriculture was criticized by Mr. MacDonald who said that the Government's aid to the farmers in Prince Edward Island was far behind that of the other provinces.

"We are losing out in our teacher training program," said Mr. MacDonald, who quoted figures to show that in the Province of New Brunswick the number of Normal Training graduates in 1953 was 135; in 1954, 255 and in 1955 there will be 390 graduates.

"I might recall to mind that it was about that time that anaesthesia, which had been introduced a few years earlier by Dr. Long and Dr. Morton, was coming into popular use.

"I know of nothing which seems to have caught the imagination of the Canadian public like the discussions and talks and gossip which surround the problem of health insurance.

"Life insurance and salary indemnity do not belong in the health field and medical care field by insuring only those groups with large employee members—with employer contributions, with a very low utilization ratio, and with contracts which do not give continuous coverage when the employee leaves his place of employment or when he is laid off or when he retires.

"The broad application of prepayment health care to a government enterprise, which is carried, comes under the general heading of health insurance. Personally I feel that this is an unfortunate terminology, because it has led to a poor definition of two branches or two methods of handling prepayment, a namely compulsory health insurance which we usually associate with the government agencies, and voluntary health insurance which generally indicates all other types of carriers.

"Health insurance is being proposed in many areas simply as a part of a political philosophy which is based on the very questionable proposition that all good and necessary services can be provided better by the state than by any other agency.

"To cry out everything that modern hospitalization and medical care can give to all Canadians on the basis of what they want, makes little impression on thinking people, unless it is coupled with a firm determination to provide for those same Canadians basic things they need in their normal life.

"The speaker was introduced by chairman George Fisher and thanked by co-chairman Hubert O'Hanley.
