### THE BOER PROBLEM.

What an American Rifleman Has to Say.

"An American Rifleman" writes as follows to an English paper, concerning the Boer problem: "Your Government would act wisely in holding the Transvaal sternly to account and displaying such force as to show even the self-conceited Boers that resistance would be folly. They think that their good shooting settles all questions of military superiority, and in this conviction they will remain intractable and drive you to extreme measures in spite of your forbearance. ### INOCULATION FOR FEVER.

Treatment Successfully Tried on Soldiers at Aldershot.

The new safeguard against malarial fever (inoculation) has recently been tried, with gratifying results, at Aldershot. About two-thirds of the men volunteered and were operated upon. The process is practically the same as ordinary vaccination except that the slight incision necessary is made lower down on the right side instead of on the arm. The immediate effect on the troops was a slight attack of malaria, and those treated were for some thirty-six hours, quite incapacitated from work of any kind, the general symptoms being severe bodily pains accompanied by a very bad headache. The patients have now, however, completely recovered, but it is hoped are rendered proof against the ravages of the malarial diseases which so severely affected the artillery, their predecessors, notably in Natal.
