High Rates of Freight.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

SIR,—Can any person show any good reason why the Government railroad and steamboat line between Halifax, Pictou, Georgetown and Charlottetown such monstrous charges as a through rate of ONE DOLLAR per barrel on herring, and twenty dollars per car from Charlottetown to Georgetown for pork intended for the Halifax market. I have understood that \$19 was recently paid by one of our merchants on twenty barrels of herring, and that another was told that 33 cents per barrel for pork in carloads was the best that could be done from Charlottetown to Georgetown. Can nothing be done to secure to the people of Prince Edward Island fair treatment? Why are we debarred from through rates over these Government lines after the Steam Navigation Company's vessels are withdrawn? Where is the Charlottetown Board of Trade?
