

# Denounce Testimony Of Doctors At Adams' Trial

LONDON (AP) — The murder trial of Dr. John Bodkin Adams neared its end Friday with opposing lawyers sharply denouncing testimony by some of the world's leading medical specialists.

"Absurd, ridiculous," defence counsel Geoffrey Lawrence said of evidence given by the Crown by Dr. Arthur Douthwaite, a foremost authority on narcotics.

"Evasive . . . an absence of frankness . . . incredible," Attorney-General Reginald Manningham-Buller said of testimony given by the defence's own medi-

cal authority, Dr. John Bishop Harman.

Where his evidence conflicts with that of other doctors it would be right to accept the other evidence in preference to his," Manningham-Buller said.

**TO JURY TUESDAY**

Lawrence would go for the defence in the three-week-long trial with a dramatic appeal for acquittal. The case likely will go to the jury Tuesday.

Lawrence said there is no proof whatever that the 58-year-old Adams made wealthy Mrs. Edith Alice Morrell an addict and then

kill her with heavy drug injections in hope of benefiting from her will.

"Trying to ease the last hours of a dying woman and promoting her comfort is a doctor's duty," Lawrence said. "It has been turned and twisted and inverted into an accusation of murder."

The murder trial, which opened March 18, is one of the most unusual, as well as the longest, in Britain's history.

The trial testimony has indicated that possibly no one, including the 260-pound doctor who sits in the prisoner's dock, may know what killed Mrs. Morrell. She died Nov. 13, 1950, leaving an estate of nearly £150,000. Adams received a Rolls-Royce car and chest of silver from her estate.

Adams attributed the death to cerebral thrombosis. But he also admitted administering heroin and morphine injections to which Dr. Douthwaite attributed her death.

A second medical authority for the crown, Dr. Michael George Ashby, said the drugs would have killed her but some natural cause could have intervened. He is consultant to six London hospitals.

For the defence, Dr. Harman said he does not believe the drugs contributed to Mrs. Morrell's death. He is an author of medical books and is located at London's St. Thomas Hospital.

But there can be no post-mortem to prove theories. Adams signed a cremation certificate the day Mrs. Morrell died and her ashes were scattered over the English Channel in 1950.

Defence counsel Lawrence, in a three-hour and 20-minute closing speech, hammered heavily on disagreement between the authorities.

"The experts—at the top of the tree so to speak — have spoken with at least two separate voices," he said.

"Where are you? Where am I, where is anybody in this room when the experts disagree?"

There were more than a score of doctors in the room as Lawrence spoke. Dozens have been attracted daily to the trial at Old Bailey. Many registered and student nurses also have sought to attend, although the courtroom has seats for only 23 spectators.

Lawrence said both Dr. Douthwaite and Dr. Ashby had testified that the heavy heroin and morphine injections would have been permissible for a dying patient in severe pain such as in a terminal cancer case.

"Who can say how severe is the pain that accompanies a permanent injury to the brain?"

Mrs. Morrell, who was 81, had suffered a stroke two years before her death and was left partially paralyzed.

Lawrence implied that a judgment against Adams might have a profound effect on doctor-patient relationships.

"I hope that human nature is not so devoid of natural emotions that it can be said nobody has to do anything in a professional relationship which evokes gratitude of the sufferer because if he does it can be held against him," he said.

Manningham-Buller will continue his summation Monday, after which the jury of 10 men and two women will be charged by Justice Sir Patrick Arthur Devlin.

Mr. Justice Devlin, one of the most respected legal authorities in Britain, dealt with many case involving medicine and chemistry as a lawyer.
