Aussie Davis Cup Team Will Make Trans-Canada Tour

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) VANCOUVER, April 20.—The Australian Davis Cup team plans to appear in exhibition games across Canada, in Calgary, Winnipeg, Toronto and Montreal. They will play here Wednesday night and leave on Thursday night for Seattle for further games there. They will then return and head across Canada. Their itinerary has not been definitely announced. The team consists of Jack Crawford, Adrian Quist and Vivian McGrath who are accompanied by Clifford Sproutie, non-playing captain. Crawford during a work-out here said he felt he had something to work on this year in building up for Davis Cup and Wimbledon play. "In previous years I seem to have played myself out in the half dozen major tournaments during our summer and generally I am not at my peak when I go on tour. This year I slackened off quite a bit and by the time I get to Philadelphia for the American zone finals I should be playing pretty good tennis."

Heavyweight Battle Set For June 18

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, April 20.—Max Schmeling, the man who was, and Joe Louis, the negro who would be heavyweight champion of the world, will battle 15 rounds in the Yankee Stadium, Thursday night, June 18.

After days of apparent indecision, promoter Mike Jacobs announced definitely today the bout would be held in the enlarged stadium and that he was calling off all negotiations aimed at transferring the match to some other city, Philadelphia, San Diego, Calif., and Cleveland, among others. Jacobs predicted the bout would gross \$1,500,000 and draw aggregate attendance of better than 90,000. Construction of additional seating facilities designed to provide accommodations for 100,000 persons for boxing already is under way at the stadium. Jacobs timed his announcement to coincide with the arrival of Schmeling, the Teuton puncher, from Germany on the Bremen tomorrow. Louis will arrive from the mid-west Wednesday to start training.

Daytona Is Favorite For Classic

Murray And Laird Watt To Wimbledon

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, April 20.—Bob Murray and Laird Watt, both of Montreal, will be sent to the Wimbledon tournament in England this summer by the Canadian Lawn Tennis Association, J. N. Kennedy, Secretary of the Association, announced tonight. The Wimbledon classic will start about June 28. Murray, 21-year-old McGill University student, is regarded as the most promising player Canada has developed in years. Many critics believe he will go much farther in international competition than any Canadian has in the past. He and Watt were sent overseas last season by the C.L.T.A., Murray winning the Scottish singles championship. This spring Bob scored victories over such high-ranking United States players as Frankie Parker and Wilmer Tines. He carried Bryan "Bitty" Grant, U. S. Davis Cup star, to five sets in the final of the Bermuda championship. While the C.L.T.A. announced several months ago it would send two players to England this season, definite announcement that Murray and Watt had been selected was not made until tonight.

Windsor Ladies Advance To Hoop Finals

By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, April 20.—Windsor Alumnae whirled their way by Montreal Notre Dame de Grace tonight to capture the eastern Canadian women's basketball title and enter the national final against Winnipeg Olympians at the Manitoba city. The Ontario girls, displaying a flashing attack that brought them right up under the basket time and again, won 42-16 tonight after taking the first game of the total-points series 39-24 Saturday. Windsor, however, may be handed the Canadian title through default of Winnipeg. T. Doug Robertson, secretary of the Province of Quebec Basketball Association, stated after the game he had received word today the final might not be played on account of difficulty in meeting the guarantee of a team travelling west.

Rhode Island Indian Wins Boston A. A. Marathon; Canadians Place Well Up

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BOSTON, April 20.—Swarthy Elson "Tarzan" Brown, a full blooded Rhode Island Indian, led home a star-studded international field today in the 40th running of the Boston A. A. Marathon with a performance that was just short of matching the record. He scored his victory, and probably ensured himself a trip to the Olympics, by jogging the 26 miles, 385 yards in two hours, 33 minutes, 40 4-5 seconds. He led for almost the entire distance and left in his wake most of the continent's prime distance men. A plodder from Narragansett who has been a "comer" for some years, won by more than a minute. Bill McMahon, little known Worcester entrant, was second, with Mel Porter of New York, the first "big name" runner to finish, third. McMahon's time was two hours, 35 minutes, 27 seconds, while Porter needed one minute, 27 seconds more. The Canadian contingent was smaller than usual, but three Toronto runners managed to land in the first 10. Alex Burnside, long a star of the Queen City, puffed home sixth in two hours 39 minutes, five seconds. Vic Callard and Jimmy Shaw, running for the Monarch A. C. of Toronto, finished ninth and 10th. Callard's time was 2:40:25. Shaw was two minutes, 13 seconds in his wake. John Paul, Indian of Springhill, N. S., wearing the pennant of the Saint John Y. M. C. I., pulled into the 13th spot. His time was 2:45:30. The next runner from the Dominion to complete the gruelling trip was Bob Hamilton of Florence, N. S. He was 20th and his time was 2:52:08. McMahon was handed the victory on a platter about three miles from the finish line when Brown slowed down to a walk. McMahon, however, came almost to a dead stop when he saw Brown staggering and reeling 100 yards ahead of him. While McMahon stopped to drink

United States Walker Cup Team Chosen

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, April 20.—The United States will defend the Walker Cup, prized team trophy of amateur golf, against Great Britain's challenge this summer with one of the youngest squads in the history of cup competition. Personnel of the 1936 squad, announced today by the U. S. Golf Association, includes six shotmakers who never previously have been selected for cup play. The others, with at least one international trophy competition behind them, were named to the squad which will oppose the British side at Pine Valley in Clementon, N. J., Sept. 2-3. The American team again will be captained by Francis Ouimet of Boston, veteran of the first eight matches of the series started in 1922. Ouimet served in a like capacity two years ago when the contests were played at St. Andrews. Whether Ouimet will play or function as advisory head is up to himself. The other members of the team are George Dunlap Jr. and George Voigt of New York; Albert "Scotty" Campbell and Harry Givan of Seattle; Reynold Smith of Dallas, Tex.; Ed White of Bonham, Tex.; Johnny Goodman of Amaha; Johnny Fischer of Cincinnati; Walter Emery of Oklahoma City and Charley Yates of Atlanta. Besides Ouimet, Dunlap, Voigt, Goodman and Fischer have been members of past teams. Emery clinched a berth last September when he pressed Lawson Little in the final round of the United States amateur championship at Cleveland. Campbell didn't survive the first round of the 1935 national, but was chosen on his record of two triumphs in the Canadian amateur trials last August.

Browns Stage Late Rally To Defeat Detroit Tigers 9-6; Athletics Down Yankees

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, April 20.—St. Louis Browns scored three runs in the seventh and six in the eighth inning today to defeat Detroit Tigers 9-6, at Detroit. It was the Browns' first victory of the season. Trailing 4-0 going into the seventh inning, the Browns batted Tony Bridges from the box. Schoolboy Rowe relieved him and lasted into the eighth inning, when Elton Hogssett relieved him with none out and one run scored in that inning. Hogssett gave way to Clarence (Red) Phillips in the same inning. Pete Fox got a home run for the Tigers in the sixth, with Bridges on base. Vernon Kennedy held Cleveland Indians to four hits at Chicago and White Sox romped home with their fourth victory of the season, 5-1. More than 6000 fans saw the young righthander win a pitchers' duel from Oral Hildebrand, who held the Sox to eight hits, but lost because they were bunched. The Sox scored in the second inning when singles by Appling and Radcliffe, a hit batsman and Dykes' sacrifice gave them two runs. The Indians didn't get a hit off Kennedy until the third and had to wait until the fifth to get their only run of the game. It came on Hal Trosky's home run into the right field stands. Washington Senators and Boston's American League Red Sox split a two-game holiday bill at Boston, the Red Sox winning the first game 6-5 and dropping the second, 6-2 before 44,700 persons. Pete Appleton's five-hit pitching for the Senators in the afternoon spiked the Sox' hitters, while his team mates started off the first inning with a three run lead. Errors by McElie and Weber and singles by Myers and Travis accounted for the Washington runs. In the second inning Stone drove Welch's offering into the centre field bleachers. In the morning game the Red Sox went on a three-hit batting spree in the last inning to win, after Myer let a grounder go through his legs and permitted Rick Feall to score and Cook to reach third. Linke and Fox each connected for home runs and doubles in the opening game. Looking like the A's of old as far as their hitting was concerned, Philadelphia Athletics came through on their home grounds with their first victory of the season, outslugging New York Yankees for a 12-11 decision. The Mackmen hammered Walter Brown and Bump Hadley for 14 hits, including a home run by George Pucenelli in the seventh, when the Athletics scored four times to tie the score. They built up an early lead but Carl Doyle was unable to hold the advantage and it took a pinch single by Chubby Dean with the bases loaded in the ninth to produce the deciding tally.
