Anti-Dumping Regulation On U.S. Spuds Is Dropped

OTTAWA—A first-time Canadian action to prevent dumping of surplus American potatoes into Canada last summer has been rescinded, Agriculture Minister Alvin Hamilton said here Thursday.

Canada, Mr. Hamilton said, about possible dumping of surplus produce into the local market can take up their problem with the Canadian Horticultural Council. This body has a wealth of information about such situations and can act quickly to request application of the anti-dumping legislation by the government.

Until this week Moslem women had been relatively safe from the Secret Army terrorists' slaughter of a thrown grenade or booby-trapped car. But this week the terrorists apparently marked them down for targets as part of their all-out campaign to provoke mass retaliation by Moslem men and thus halt Algerian independence.

Committee Will Study Spud Problem

The government's Executive Council met yesterday with delegations of potato growers from West Prince and East Kings who are seeking government compensation for low yields and disease losses in last year's potato crop.

The original action to impose the restrictions on the entry of American potatoes was taken at the request of the Canadian Horticultural Council, which is a clearing house for all potato fruit and vegetable growers in Canada. The council received strong support from British Columbia's Okanagan fruit area which has been concerned with the dumping of American surplus soft fruit in the Canadian market.
