THE WEST RIVER ELECTION.

There is more silly bluster and twaddle in the Patriot of last evening regarding the West River election than has appeared in that paper for some time—and that is saying a good deal. The Patriot's statement that the Government was not afraid to open the district is too transparent. Why was not the election held months ago when Mr. Wise was hoodwinked into resigning his seat? Why was the writ kept back by the Government until the eleventh hour? Why was the district deprived of one of its representatives during the last session? Actions speak louder than words;—and the actions of the Government in this matter point to the fact that they were afraid to hold the election in question. Now that an election is to be held—when the Government's evil day can no longer be put off—the Patriot brags and blusters and prates about "the uprightness of the course" of the Government. But our contemporary is only whistling to keep its courage up. Its tune will be different after the election.

AFRAID OF INVESTIGATION.

The Patriot applauds the action of the Laurier administration in voting out clause nineteen of the charges made by Mr. Monk regarding the emergency ration. In so doing the Patriot is following the course pursued by other hide-bound journals of the Grit persuasion. But what does clause nineteen say? Here it is:—

"And the said Frederick D. Monk also believes that he can establish by satisfactory evidence that the minister of militia and defence, the said Hon. Frederick William Borden, was guilty of gross and culpable negligence (a) in making with undue haste, the agreement hereinabove referred to of the 4th of January, 1900, for the supply of emergency rations to the Canadian troops, in South Africa, with irresponsible parties; (b) in not having the preparations of said rations controlled by competent men, and the supply furnished to the troops carefully and rigidly inspected and tested; (c) in neglecting, after he had received said letter of January 25th last, to take the steps commanded by the ordinary rules of prudence to ensure the protection of the troops; and (d) in paying the amount of the said contract, \$4,660 in a case where he must have known that any recovery of the same was impossible and without any investigation."

This is the charge against the Minister of Militia, a charge which the Government would not allow a select committee of the House of Commons to enquire into. It seems to THE EXAMINER that the Minister, if he was conscious of his administrative integrity, would have insisted upon a prompt investigation into the charge with a view to proving its falsity. But it was not deemed advisable to adopt this manly course, and the scope of the enquiry was limited to an investigation of persons outside the House. The action of the Minister must condemn him and his Government in the eyes of the people.

—The Patriot calls upon the Acadian electors to support Premier Parqharson and his colleagues because the opposition press has been making some remarks regarding the conduct of Pineau. But the Acadians of this province are too intelligent to be caught by such chaff. The straw at which the drowning administration is clutching will not avail it much.

**LETTER FROM
MR. GEO. E. HUGHES.**

SIR,—I notice the City Council are again calling for tenders for street lighting. I would suggest that the Council seriously consider the advantages of operating a plant along the same lines as our present system of water and sewerage. I would suggest that the Council purchase the most modern plant and place it on the city property at Pownall Wharf in such a position that the coal and other material required for the use of same could be landed direct in the works, and the stone for macadamizing could also be landed direct from vessels, thereby saving considerable expense. The stone crusher could be placed in such a position as to be operated by the electric light plant. Our sewerage construction will soon be completed, and then our Water Commissioners could manage all with very little extra expense and we would have cheaper and better light.
