

## Britain To Lose Legend As Lord Chief Justice Retires

LONDON (AP) — With the retirement this year of Lord Chief Justice Goddard, Britain will lose a legend—an English judge who reads Dickens, thinks criminals ought to be flogged, and enjoys telling spicy jokes.

At 81, spry and wiry, Lord Goddard comes bustling into a courtroom adjusting his long white wig.

"Your appeal is of an imprudent nature," he will castigate one lawyer. Or he will ask scathingly: "Am I correct in thinking you are going to make what I might call the usual defence?"

He has a painstaking sympathetic concern for the rights of the little man. As lord chief justice he presides over the entire administration of the common law courts but he personally hears cases that may seem trivial. The lord chief justice hears ordinary civil and criminal cases along with the other judges of the Queen's Bench.

A widower, he lives alone and seldom goes out except to visit his grandchildren.

It's a treat when he does go to a party. His repertoire of all-male jokes is the envy of professional London. He is not as choosy about wines as he once was—in younger days he would take his own wines with him to a dinner party if he was not acquainted with his host's cellar.

**NAMED BY LABOR**  
Goddard was appointed lord chief justice by the Labor government in 1946. He has been distinctly non-political, though by no means averse to political significance, so that any criticism will be of him and not a lesser judge.

"They can say what they like about me," he says, "but at least I'm honest!"

NEW GLASGOW, — (CP) — An electric light or power user appeared here Tuesday to discuss proposed increase in rates of the Pictou County power board. The public utilities board held a public hearing.

Details of the application for increases were presented by the general manager of the publicly owned power board, G. R. Saunders.

The board sought permission to raise the basic urban rate from two cents a kilowatt hour to 2.2 cents. The proposed rates were said to be still the lowest in the Maritimes and lower than those which prevailed from 1946 to 1951.

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## Make Sputnik-age Gadgets In Former Halifax Stable

HALIFAX (CP) — In a former stable, Cossor (Canada) Limited is producing Sputnik-age electronic equipment for countries from Russia to Nigeria.

Company secretary and security officer Frank Entwistle says most of the firm's more than \$2,000,000 annual business is confined to defence contracts. The payroll last year was worth \$850,000 to the Halifax area.

"Cossor came here 10 years ago," he said. "It has grown, but it's still small. When we move into our new building in December we will have plenty of room for expansion."

This month the company accepted an offer from the Crown-owned Industrial Estates Limited to build a \$400,000 building on a site near Dartmouth, across the harbor. Mr. Entwistle said the company turned down contracts because of lack of capacity in the present building.

**MAIN WORK RESEARCH**  
"Research and development is

one of our main divisions of work," he said.

If Canada ever enters the guided missile and earth satellite field Cossor feels it would be playing an important part in research and development.

A portable machine for recording the height of the ionosphere was developed by Cossor for the Defence Research Board. Used in geophysical year research, the recorder has been placed in 10 Canadian stations including remote Resolution Island.

The recorder sells for \$5,000. A United States model, not portable, sells for \$40,000. Cossor has sold five recorders to Russia, three to the United States, and single units to Portugal, Nigeria, South Africa and Britain.

A service and repair department has contracts with the RCAF and the navy for the overhaul of parts and machines.

**FEEL MARKET PINCH**  
Cossor feels the competitive pinch with Toronto and Montreal

firms. Freight rates to central Canadian points cut profits.

"But we're fortunate because most of our products are fairly light in weight," said Mr. Entwistle.

"One thing that's developed beyond our expectations is a hi-fi record player that can double for a public address system. These have been installed in many Nova Scotia schools and now we're moving into Ontario, Quebec and British Columbia.

"We don't call it hi-fi—but rather, extended frequency range. It's ideal for schools, very robust and stands kicking about."

While there has been a steady increase in production, research and primary work in design and development continue to be the big thing at Cossor.

"As our facilities improve we may be able to turn out a bread and butter line—articles for the general public."

"Up to now we've been handicapped in this by the lack of space in our present quarters."

### Pickersgill May Write 3rd Volume Of King's Biography

OTTAWA (CP) — J. W. Pickersgill, Liberal Commons member for Bonaville-Twillington and a long-time associate of William Lyon Mackenzie King, may be commissioned to write the third volume of the late prime minister's biography.

Mr. Pickersgill, former Liberal citizenship minister, said in an interview Tuesday he has been doing work on the third volume for some time. "I have been authorized to do some work on it," he added.

However, he said no one has been formally commissioned to write the volume. He declined to speculate on reports he is in line for the task.

Mr. Pickersgill is one of the four literary executors of Mackenzie King, who died in 1950. The others are Fred A. McGregor of Ottawa, like Mr. Pickersgill a former secretary to Mr. King; Dr. W. Kaye Lamb, Dominion archivist, and Norman Robertson, Canadian ambassador in Washington.

mer political science professor of the University of Toronto, who died last week in Halifax. It is to be published in the fall.

Dr. Blair Neatby, 34, assistant professor of history at the University of British Columbia, now is in Ottawa to prepare the second volume, covering Mr. King's activities from 1923 until the end of the Second World War.

Mr. Pickersgill was a lecturer in history at the University of Manitoba for 10 years before he joined the external affairs department in 1937 when he obtained post standing in Canada-wide competition for posts with the department.

He was a secretary for Mackenzie King from 1937 to 1952, and secretary to the cabinet in 1952-53. He became secretary of state in 1953 and immigration minister the following year.

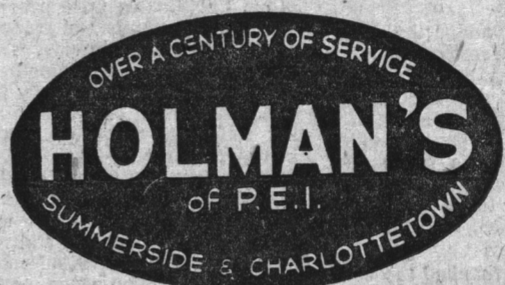
The following resolution was passed by the City Council at the regular monthly meeting held on July 8th, 1958:
