TRUE BILL

who is presiding at the King's County Assizes, said that the County has had an enviable record for law enforcement and there had been no great number of serious crimes or other breaches of the law.

He stated that the Sheriff's report showed that since the November sittings last year there had been a greater number of people in jail than usual with 35 prisoners. One was charged with murder, two with manslaughter, one for creating a disturbance and 31 for offences connected with liquor. Of the latter 23 had been for Temperance Act violations, 1 Excise Act and 7 for operating motor vehicles while the ability to drive was impaired by alcohol.

Chief Justice Campbell said that the normal hazards of operating a motor vehicle on the highway were great enough without aggravating them by offences of this type. He said there were many fatal accidents which could be avoided and most of them were the result of negligence on the part of the vehicle operator or a pedestrian.

"When human recklessness is added to by an ability impaired by alcohol we have a condition not at all conducive to safety on the highway. If a person has his ability to drive impaired, he should not drive at all."

The Chief Justice said he did not know if the increase in the number shown was due to increased law breaking in King's County or to increased vigilance on the part of police. If it was the latter he thought it was a commendable situation in that the police were attempting to offer prevention before the matter became serious.

Two Charges

He said that on the present court docket there were two charges against the one man — "One of a sordid nature, the other a tragedy". The Chief Justice said Joseph Gabriel MacDonald stands charged with two offences. The first charge is rape against Mary Estelle MacKinnon, the second is murder of Mary Ann MacKinnon.

He added that for good reasons the Court was reversing the chronological order and was dealing with the murder charge first. The rape charge was relevant to the murder charge only in that there was such a charge pending at the time of the murder. The slain woman had taken an active and prominent part in the investigation and prosecution of the first charge and the accused actively resented her action.

His Lordship then briefly reviewed the events leading to the tragedy and he felt the grand jury would have no difficulty in determining that it was a 22 calibre bullet which caused the victim's death. He told the jurors that murder was homicide with malice aforethought. If the bullet had gone through the window unintentionally or accidentally there was no malice involved and thus no murder.

He suggested the jury pay attention to the contour of the ground outside the kitchen window of the MacKinnon home and told them that it was level for only a very short distance and thereafter sloped sharply downward. The inference, he said, was that the gun used had been fired from a short distance from the north side of the kitchen wall. He then briefly reviewed the evidence against the accused and told of threatening remarks made by him to a witness.

Appeal Case In Supreme Court

"In the appeal case from a conviction before Stipendiary Magistrate Joseph MacDonald on an excise charge—The Queen versus Quentin Mossman—Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell in King's County Supreme Court yesterday at Georgetown took the appeal under advisement. The conviction was under Section 169 of the Excise Act. The appellant did not appear in court although his counsel Mr. Melvin J. McQuaid was present. Mr. S. S. Hessian, Q. C., represented the Crown. The defence counsel argued for the allowance of the appeal on the basis of evidence taken in the lower court.

prior to the shooting. When the Grand Jury returned in the afternoon with a true bill, Chief Justice Campbell noted that they had heard the testimony of only three witnesses. He suggested that they return to the jury room and hear the evidence of Michael Francis MacDonald, Little Harbour, who worked on the MacKinnon farm and who was present in the kitchen when Mrs. MacKinnon was shot. He was the witness to whom the accused had previously made remarks construed as threats to the victim.

Charged Last Year

Joseph Gabriel MacDonald was charged last year with the rape of a daughter of Mrs. MacKinnon. On learning of it Mrs. MacKinnon had filed a complaint with the R.C.M.P. and had appeared in Magistrate's court in Georgetown at MacDonald's hearing on the charge. He was out on bail at the time of the shooting of Mrs. MacKinnon and was living at the home of his father in Chesterow, a little over two miles from the MacKinnon home.

The Chief Justice released the witnesses in the murder case until 11 o'clock this morning. Those called as witnesses in the rape case were released until 11 o'clock Monday morning.

He then told the Grand Jury their next duty was to inspect "this public building" and the attached jail. He said it was obvious that much commendable work had been done on the Court, building in last year and he felt the jury might well express appreciation to the authorities. He said they also had a general duty to consider the state of law enforcement in the county.

Court was adjourned till 10 o'clock this morning.
