PROPER CUSTODY OF THE HEN.—The Connecticut legislature has been gravely deliberating on measures for the proper custody of the hen. A decree has been passed imposing a penalty of seven dollars on the owner of a hen every time the bird trespasses on a neighbor's property.

SMITH AND MITCHELL.—Arrangements have been completed for a glove fight between Jim Smith and Charley Mitchell for \$400 and the championship of England. The men are to meet on the 23rd in a 10-round glove contest, each round to last three minutes with one minute rest between each.

A VICTIM OF THE TOBACCO HABIT.—Advices from Paris state that sentence of death has been passed at Oran, in Algeria, upon a French soldier named Vertijoie, found guilty of throwing a quid of tobacco at Col. Thierry, president of the court martial, which had found Vertijoie guilty of attempted desertion.

A THIEF CAPTURED.—Wm. Burgess, dealer in canned supplies at Mimico, near Toronto, Ont., who fled a week ago with \$37,000 of his creditors' money, was arrested at Buffalo, N. Y., on Thursday night. Burgess had deposited \$10,200 in the Third National Bank and \$2,700 in the Bank of Buffalo. What he did with the rest is not known.

CONCERT AT SOURIS.—The "St. Patrick's Concert" at Souris, on Monday evening, was very successful. The musical portion of the programme was well carried out. The address of R. K. Fitzgerald, Esq., dealt with some of the early missionary work in Canada. It was very interesting and instructive, and was well received. Mr. A. B. Warburton also delivered a short address.

BAD FOR THE TAILORS.—There are nearly 500 tailors in and near Boston out of work, because as alleged, the local clothing manufacturers send their goods to New York city to be made up by the cheap labor of the tenement house districts. There is much distress among the tailors arising from a lack of work. The tailors in Boston charge that the clothing made by the New York tenement house workers is impregnated with the germs of disease.

ATTEMPTED TRAIN WRECKING.—A diabolical attempt was made last Wednesday night to wreck the Canada Atlantic passenger train from Montreal to Ottawa. A twenty-foot log was placed across the track near the bridge which spans Indian river, about twenty-seven miles this side of Ottawa. The engineer noticed an object across the track, but was unable to stop the train in time. Fortunately, however, the train did not leave the track, and beyond some injury to the locomotive, little damage was done. It is thought the intention of the fiends was to run the train into the South Indian river. A reward of \$1,000 has been offered by the railway, and it is thought the scoundrels will be captured.

A Strong Bench.

The following is the Bench of Judges appointed to determine upon prizes to be awarded in the Dominion competition for Historical essays relating to Canada and Newfoundland:

Chief Justice—The Right Honorable the Marquis of Lorne, P. C., G. C. M. G.

For Newfoundland, Manitoba and British Columbia—S. E. Dawson, Esq., M. A., Montreal.

For New Brunswick—A. A. Stockton, Esq., Q. C., D. C. L., L. L. D., St. John.

For Prince Edward Island—Judge Alley, Charlottetown.

For Quebec—J. C. Harper, M. A., Ph. D., L. H. S., &c., Quebec.

For Ontario—William Houston, M. A., Toronto.

The Judges above named will determine upon the essays relating to the districts for which they are appointed, and the Marquis of Lorne will make a final selection from the Provincial prize essay, and award the Dominion prize to the author of the best of them.

While Parliament is dealing with the question of Judges' salaries, would it not be well to take into consideration the claims of this distinguished Bench, recently formed, but having such an extensive jurisdiction.

Recent events rather weaken the claim of the London Times to the title of "Thunderer," but it must feel like thunder all the same.—Boston Commercial Bulletin.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 19.

Sir John Macdonald presented the official correspondence on the subject of the Jesuits Estates Bill.

The debate on the budget was resumed by Mr. Cockburn.

Mr. Davies followed, dealing largely with the management of the Intercolonial Railway and charging that freight rates had been placed too low on that line. He took Mr. Wood, of Westmorland, to task for the assertion that there was prosperity throughout the Maritime Provinces. Continuing he pictured the Maritime Provinces as in a state of stagnation.

After recess, the debate was continued by Messrs. Semple and Patterson, of Brant, for the Opposition, and Hon. John Haggart and Mr. Dickey for the Government.

Mr. Dickey defined the Conservative policy as commercial reciprocity, and the Opposition policy as unrestricted union with the United States.

At 1.15 the House divided, and the resolution offered in amendment to the motion to go into committee of supply was lost on a division of 78 to 12.

House adjourned at 1.25.

The Jesuit's Bill Again.

TORONTO, Ont., March 19.

The Globe reiterates its opinion that the Jesuits State Act would be disallowed, but declines to be called an opponent of Provincial rights. The paper and a prominent correspondent protest against the platform of the new third party, which has anti-Jesuitism for one plank and Prohibition for another.

QUEBEC, March 19.

Mr. Tarte, in Le Canadien to-day has an important article which may be regarded as the Roman Catholic answer to the Toronto Globe's demand for disallowance of the Jesuits' bill. Their argument in support of the position taken is this: (1st) that the Ottawa Government is pledged against disallowance, and cannot go back on the report of the Minister of Justice, and the Order in Council officially communicated to the Quebec Government declaring the bill will not be voted. (2nd) That the Pope's name appears in the bill, not as sovereign authority acting upon the legislature, but mostly as a party to a simple contract or bargain, which the legislature has a right to make; 3rd, that the Pope, like any one else, can be a party to a contract with any government not excepting the British Government.

Terrible Railway Accident.

CAMPBELLTON, N. B., March 19.

One of the saddest and most disastrous accidents to life and property which has been our painful duty to chronicle, happened about one mile west of Rimouski this morning. The express No. 33 had left Rimouski, and while running at full speed collided with a special freight train running east from River DeLoup that had not its orders and tried to cross the express at Rimouski, but owing to a heavy train being on, and perhaps heavy curves, was unable to do so. Engineer Horace Whitney, son of H. A. Whitney, Mechanical Superintendent of the I. C. R., and Fireman John F. Hoy, of the express, Conductor McLeod and the fireman of the special were killed. Very little freight was damaged and no baggage. The passengers also escaped.

In Favor of Union.

ST. JOHN, N. B., March 20.

The City of St. John to-day gave a majority of 556 in favor of union with Portland, while the latter's majority was 140. Both parties being willing, marriage will be probably consummated at an early day.
