Grotesque Warriors. Here is a fetching description of a military review which we cull from Mr. Harold Gorst's book on China: "At one extremity of the field there was raised on a slight elevation of the ground a platform shaded by an immense red parasol and ornamented with lanterns, streamers and some large lanterns that did not seem particularly necessary, as the sun was shining in full splendor. The inspector extraordinary of the imperial army and the principal civic and military mandarins of the town were on the platform, seated in armchairs before little tables covered with tea things and boxes filled with excellent tobacco. The moment arrived to begin. A little culverin that stood near the platform was fired off, the military judges covering their ears with their hands to protect them from the frightful detonation, then a yellow flag was hoisted to the top of one of the forts, the tom-toms sounded a furious charge, and the soldiers rushed together pell-mell, uttering terrible cries and grouping themselves around the flag of their company. "It is impossible to imagine anything more whimsical and comic than the evolutions of the Chinese soldiers. They advance, draw back, leap, pirouette, cut capers, crouch behind their shields, as if to watch the enemy, then jump up again, distribute blows right and left and then run away with all their might, crying, "Victory, victory!"

THE ROMAN NUMERALS. Only a Few of Them Will Be Needed to Indicate Next Year. "Have you noticed," said the pale mathematician, "how much easier it is going to be, after this year, to write the number of the year in Roman numerals?" "What do I want to write the year in Roman numerals for?" said the ruddy business man. "Maybe you don't," the pale mathematician answered, "but notice the difference. "That will be written in Romans 'MMCCCLXXXVIII'—thirteen letters again." The ruddy business man was getting more and more uneasy. "And what—what of it?" he said. "Why, only think," said the pale mathematician, "how many generations of our descendants will never see a year so short as 1900, and how many and many more will never see a year so long to write as 1888." "And what of—what of that?" said the ruddy business man. "Nothing, I suppose," said the pale mathematician, "only these things always impress me."

SUPREME COURT. MONDAY, Jan. 22. McLeod vs. Schurman. This case was argued on Saturday, and the Court met this morning to deliver judgment. It was an application of the defendant in this suit to be discharged from jail. It appears that the defendant was committed to Queen's County jail under an execution issued out of the County Court of Prince County. The law requires that the Clerk of a County Court can only issue an execution against the body of a defendant when an affidavit is made showing facts and circumstances that a defendant is about to depart in order to defraud his creditors. The affidavit in this case only stated that the plaintiff had been informed by a person and believed that the defendant was about to leave P. E. I. to defraud him. The court unanimously held that this affidavit did not satisfy the law.

Objection was taken to the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court to grant relief. The Court however held that it had jurisdiction over all inferior courts, and could interfere in the present case. The defendant was released from jail. Stewart, Q. C. for the applicant, and Morson, Q. C. for the creditor.

The Government of New Brunswick has been reconstructed, Mr. Emerson taking with the Premiership the office of Attorney General, and Mr. White (late Attorney General) becoming Chief Commissioner of Public Works, while Mr. H. A. McKeown, of St. John, enters the Government without portfolio.

The reported spread of smallpox at Campbellton, Chatham, Dalhousie and other points in New Brunswick is a matter of vital importance. The health authorities here ought to be on their guard, and it is pleasing to note that they are.
