

# Commons Told Canada's Industrial Research Lagging

OTTAWA (CP)—Industrial research by Canadian industry lags behind that of many of the highly industrialized countries, a government spokesman said Friday.

However, John Dickey, parliamentary assistant to Trade Minister Howie, reported that not all military research by the federal government compares favorably with that of any other country on a per capita basis. The government now was spending \$70,000,000 annually for that purpose.

Mr. Dickey was replying, during Commons study of estimates of the National Research Council and Atomic Energy of Canada, to a Progressive Conservative demand for government action to stimulate research by private industry.

George Hees, Toronto broker, and J. W. Murphy, Lamb West, argued that more research should be done in Canada to help industry meet foreign competition both home and export markets.

## TURN OVER INFORMATION

During the discussion, Mr. Howe reports to Parliament for NBC and AECL, told Howard Green (PC-Vancouver Quadra) that all government information on the use of atomic power for generating electricity will be turned over to private industry.

He also said the government is exploring the possibility of using atomic power plants to produce power for the Mid-Canada radar line along the 55th parallel, being built by this country.

## New R.A.F. Jet Bomber

LONDON, (Reuters)—A new RAF jet bomber which can fly much higher than any known fighter plane has completed its first test flights, the makers announced here Friday.

The bomber, an improved version of the English Electric Company's Mark IX Canberra, can probably fly higher than any other aircraft in the world but its precise operations are not disclosed.

An earlier plane of the same type holds the present world altitude record of 63,668 feet—more than 12 miles.

The plane, designed for long-range photographic reconnaissance sorties at extreme altitudes, has been ordered in quantity for the RAF.

# Premier Plans Aid For Farmers Hit Hard By Hazel

Assistance will be forthcoming from the Government to certain farmers who lost buildings throughout the Province during the Hurricane Hazel gale of last Fall. This was announced yesterday by Premier Matheson who pointed out that there were cases where farmers had lost barns which they thought enough of to insure for fire but who through the Farmer's Mutual Insurance Company were unable to obtain storm damage.

The proposed assistance plan is to apply only to damage suffered in Hurricane Edna and will not apply to any damage which is suffered in future hurricanes.

While the exact details of the plan have not been worked out, it is proposed to reimburse farmers for a certain percentage of the fire insurance carried at the time. "Farmers in future will have to go to other companies if they wish to have storm damage on their buildings," the Premier said.

On the other hand the Government will not indiscriminately pay for all damage whether it comes under the terms of the plan or not. Consideration will be given to the financial status of the applicant. That is to say a man with \$100,000

in the bank would in all likelihood have his application turned down, or other words the compensation will be made on a means test basis.
