HONORS FOR AN ISLAND BOY.—At the closing exercises of St. Mary's University and Seminary, at Baltimore, on the 13th inst., Mr. Joseph Roche, son of Michael Roche, of Montague Cross, succeeded in winning the highest honors of his class in Geology, Astronomy, Physics and Philosophy, receiving at the same time the degree of B. A., "cum maxima laude." Mr. Roche was one of two to take part in a public convocation, and acquitted himself most creditably, carrying off as a prize the complete works of Cardinal Wiseman in sixteen richly bound volumes. The young gentleman has already distinguished himself at the Princes of Wales College and at the University of Ottawa, and was for several years a prominent figure in educational circles throughout the Island. Since leaving P. E. Island, he has filled with distinction a professor's chair in All Hallows' College, Salt Lake City. He resigned that position to study for the ecclesiastical state, in which there is every reason to hope that his eminent talents will shed the highest lustre. Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, June 23.

The Minister of Marine and Fisheries has received a letter from a gentleman in Newfoundland which states that the report of the delegates who visited Scotland and Holland in connection with the herring industry has been widely read and much appreciated in Newfoundland, the report having been forwarded to a practical and exceedingly valuable. The Fishery Board of Scotland has also written to the Department conveying their appreciation of the valuable information contained in the report.

SAN SALVADOR, June 23.

President Muenoz died suddenly last night, soon after the conclusion of a banquet. During the panic caused by the President's death, Gen. Marchal and several other officers were killed at the barracks. Gen. Carlos Ezta, leader of the forces, is now in command, and all is quiet at present.
