Notes and Comments.

The air and prospects of Victoria Park are delightful at this season; but before they can be enjoyed the river Styx must be crossed.

Legislative Council Election.

An elector resident in the First District of Prince County reports that the second convention called by the Liberals to nominate a man to contest the First District at the forthcoming election, which was necessitated by the storm raised over the result of last convention, took place at O'Leary yesterday, when, after a long wrangle, Murphy received the largest number of votes, and was again made the nominee, amidst the same dissension as before. He says that even the intelligent Liberals have decided that "Joseph must go."

A reliable correspondent informs us that Messrs. Nicholson and Ross are meeting with grand success in their political campaign in the southern parts of the county where they have recently held meetings, and judging from the enthusiastic reception accorded them by the intelligent yeomanry of the district, they will be returned to the Legislative Council on the 30th inst., with handsome majorities.

A gentleman writing from the Murray Harbor district reports:—Mr. William A. Poole, the Liberal Conservative Candidate for the Legislative Council, is meeting with great success in his canvass. Many prominent Grits are giving him their support. His election, therefore, is beyond a doubt. His opponent, Mr. Aiken, is becoming desperate, but it is to be hoped that he will be able to sustain another defeat with all the grace of a fallen hero. He will have an opportunity on the eve of the 30th inst. of knowing how the independent electors appreciate him as he exclaims—

"Shades of the mighty can it be, That this is all that's left of me."

JAPANESE VILLAGE.—The Japanese Village will open in Hillsborough Rink to-night and there is no doubt it will have a successful season. The Halifax Herald thus speaks of it: "The Japs closed their season at the Exhibition Rink on Saturday afternoon. The show has been a great success as regards the public as well as the management. The attendance has aggregated tens of thousands and the favor with which the cunning workmen from the land of the rising sun have been received has been unqualified. The attendance on Saturday reached the big total of 4,100. At the afternoon reception each child present was delighted with a present of some article of Japanese workmanship. Manager Somerby in a neat speech thanked the people, the press and the local manager for the pleasant visit which all had contributed to make for the company. The show opens at Charlottetown to-morrow."

Queen Square Fountain!

SIR,—Is it not a shame and a disgrace to all parties concerned to allow that fountain to remain dry during the short summer weather which we now enjoy? Strangers crowd the hotels and private boarding houses in our city and by our seashore. The cool, refreshing and invigorating influence of the water from the fountain is withheld from citizens and strangers alike. Surely the handsome collection list which appears in THE EXAMINER of the 19th inst.,—added to the services of the manager and superintendent of Queen Square Gardens, which does not cost the City Council a cent, should induce that body to start the fountain, which has at present the appearance of an old, moss grown ruin, or an abandoned well, more than a water-fountain.

The Proposed Masonic Temple.

The Temple which the Masonic fraternity propose building will, if the plans drawn by Messrs. Chappell & Phillips are followed, be one of the handsomest public buildings erected in this city in recent years. The accommodation which will be furnished by a structure such as it is intended the Temple shall be, is badly needed in Charlottetown, and THE EXAMINER hopes that the directors will be enabled to proceed with the work of erection at an early date. The lot on which it is proposed to erect the Temple has a frontage of 84 feet on Grafton Street, which will give entrance to the building on either side. The building will be 155 feet long by 64 feet wide, and the central portion of the front hall will rise to a height of 60 feet. The front will be built of Nova Scotia freestone, and the back and sides of brick. The public hall, or theatre, will be 60x60 feet clear of stage and lobby, with a ceiling 40 feet high. The floor of the hall will be on a sharp incline to the rear end of the building, thus giving every person a clear and unobstructed view of the stage, &c. Four private boxes will be arranged next the stage, and a gallery will run around three sides of the room. The theatre will be fitted up with all the modern improvements, including opera chairs, etc. The total seating accommodation will be about 1,200. The main entrance to the theatre and other parts of the building will be from Grafton Street, through a passage way (the floor of which will be inclined) 16 feet wide, starting a few steps from the sidewalk and landing in the lobby, or first floor hall, at a height of 8 feet from the street level. There will also be side entrances to the theatre and dressing rooms. The stage will be 60x40 feet in size. On a level with the stage, and adjoining the same, but outside the main building, there will be large and well-ventilated dressing rooms. On each side of the main entrance there will be a large store, 40x22 feet, and a room over each store the same size. Back entrances to these stores and rooms will be arranged which will make them convenient places of business. The basement will contain restaurant, billiard room, barber shop, offices, bowling alley, etc. The second floor will be laid off into a hall 40x30 feet, offices, etc. The third floor will be used for Masonic purposes, and will be fitted up with lodge room 60x30, refreshment room 32x50, and ante-rooms. Access will be had to all parts of the building through roomy halls and by wide easy platform stairs, and all parts of the building will be well lighted, heated and ventilated.
