CONTRACT BRIDGE

By B. JAY BECKER The finesse succeeds, he will make the contract. But this finesse has only a 50-50 chance to win. If it loses, the contract is almost surely defeated, since East will presumably return a diamond whereupon declarer, left to his own devices, is practically certain to lose a club trick. South should not settle for this line of play, though it clearly has a chance to succeed, without first investigating other methods of play that will increase his chances beyond the 50-50 level. The method of play that makes it nearly certain that the contract will succeed is to cash the A-K of clubs and then give up a club trick. One possible result of these plays is that East's cards may be such that he is forced to win the third club lead. If this happens, play may just as well cease, since any possible return by East is bound to eliminate declarer's diamond loser. If it turns out West wins the club trick, as in the actual hand, he will be compelled to lead a diamond. If West was dealt either the ten or queen of diamonds, the contract is then assured. Possession of the queen by West is automatically fatal to him. If West has the ten and leads it, the jack play from dummy guarantees victory; if West leads low away from the ten, a low card is played from dummy, thus trapping the queen.

1959 Marks 50th Anniversary Of Powered Flight In Canada The year 1959 is an important one in the annals of aviation, for it marks the 50th anniversary of powered flight in Canada and the 35th anniversary of the RCAF. To mark these occasions many air shows and static displays are being planned across the country. One of these events, the RCAF national model aircraft contest, is of particular interest to the boys of our nation. The contest itself is divided into two classes, with classes one and two under direct sponsorship of the RCAF. Class three, on open competition, is under the sponsorship of the national council of the golden jubilee of flight in Canada. To be eligible for class one, the contestant must not be under 13 years nor over 19 years of age; the model must be constructed by the contestant himself and must be constructed to scale from the official plans provided by the RCAF, and be the model designated to the contestant's geographical area. 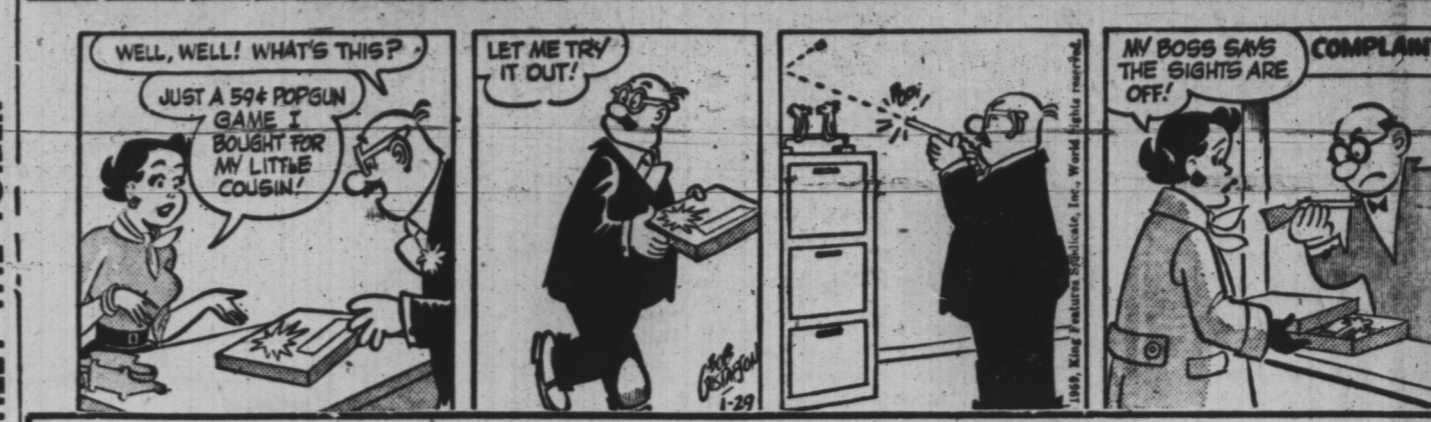

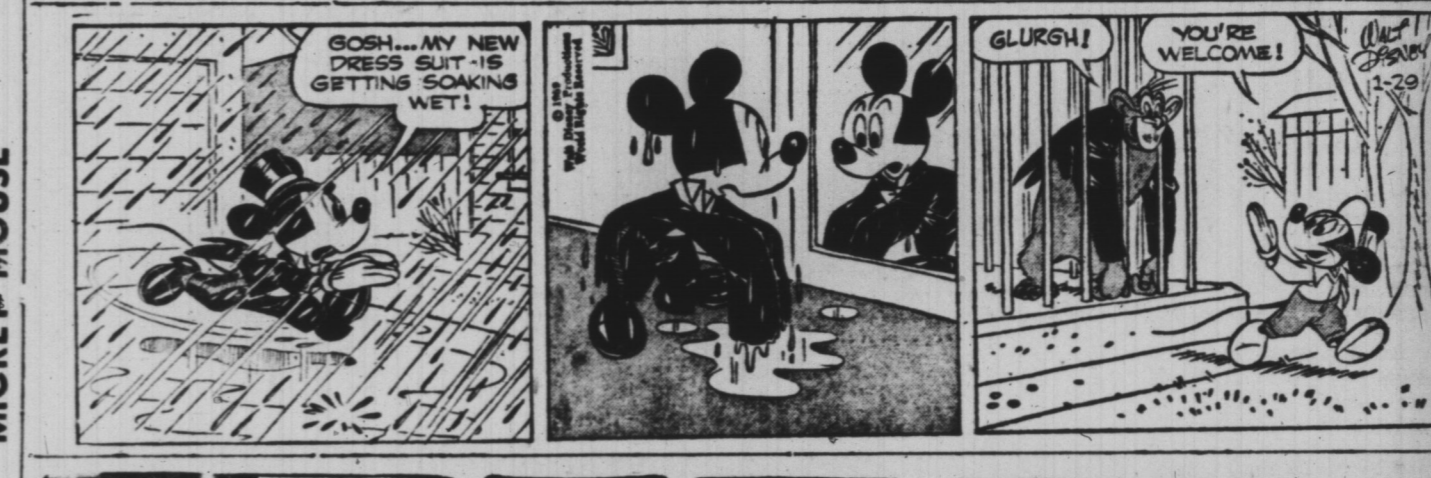
