

CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

The Sewer Bill and Other Important Measures.

The special meeting of the City Council held last evening transacted a good deal of business having a bearing upon legislation.

On motion of Councillor Crabbe the Council joined with the Water Commissioners in a memorial to the Legislature asking for power to issue debentures for \$12,000 to meet the cost of putting in a second engine and pump at the pumping station.

Councillor Crabbe brought up the matter of further amending the Act of Incorporation by providing that West Kent school and the furniture of the other schools for which the school debentures were issued be vested in the City Council instead of in the School Board, and a bill in accordance therewith was introduced.

Councillors Taylor and Horne also spoke in approval of the proposed Legislation, and said they failed to understand how any body of men with a knowledge of all the facts could oppose the measure.

The bill was submitted and approved by the Council and ordered to be transmitted to the Legislature.

A bill was also submitted and ordered to be forwarded to the Legislature providing for the regulation of bicycles and the taxing of the same if deemed expedient.

The waterworks bill was then taken up and further considered clause by clause. Several changes were made. The date of the election of Commissioners was changed to the first Wednesday in June, and provision was made for under-drains in certain sections of the city.

Councillor Crabbe introduced a by-law respecting the sale of meat. The by-law provides that all persons selling fresh, salt or corned meat by retail in the market, about the streets or in any house or shop must pay a license fee of \$25.

On the second reading of the by-law, Councillor Lyons protested against exacting a license for selling salt meat in small stores, pointing out that there was many a poor woman who made her living in this way.

Councillor McCarron supported the contention of Councillor Lyons regarding the sale of salt meats, and seconded his motion.

Councillor Crabbe also introduced a by-law amending the by-law relating to theatres and shows. The by-law provides that a yearly license may at any time be granted the proprietor of any opera house, music hall or other public hall, the amount of said license to be fixed by the Council.

Meeting adjourned until 10 a. m., on Wednesday.

At the special meeting this morning the two by-laws were read a third time and passed. It was ordered that they be published in THE EXAMINER and Patriot newspapers for two weeks.

Colored Troops.

It is learned in Washington that should necessity develop, the first U. S. troops sent to Cuba will include the 24th and 25th infantry and the 9th and 10th cavalry. These four regiments are being held in readiness, and arrangements are made for a large number of recruiting stations to bring the battalions to a strength of 1,800 men each or 7,200 in all.

Since the battle of Wounded Knee in the west, not a word has been heard in derogation of the fighting qualities of the American negro. As to discipline, steadiness and marksmanship, the colored regiments of the army have been climbing up the scale until they rank with the very best.

Not only will the colored regulars go among the first American soldiers landed in Cuba, but a mobilization of colored volunteers will be one of the earliest acts after there is no longer any doubt about war. South Carolina has a regiment of colored guards, and most of the southern states have fairly good organizations of colored militia.

On the next evening the newly married couple, accompanied by a procession of sleigh-drove to their home in White Sands, where they were met by a number of the friends of the groom, and where a second wedding was prepared and after doing justice to the sumptuous supper, which was most enjoyable, and the red rays of the rising sun found all but sorry the night were not longer, and after much hand shaking and many fond wishes for the future happiness of Mr. and Mrs. Bull, the company dispersed. The wedding presents were both numerous and costly.

Be it enacted by the City Council, of the City of Charlottetown, that sections one of the said By-law, be amended by adding the following words: 'Provided never the less, that it shall be lawful for the City Council, upon application of the owners or managers of any Opera House, Music Hall or other Public Hall of any kind, to grant a yearly license for such sum as may be determined upon, by resolution of said Council. JAMES WARBURTON, M. D., Mayor. H. M. DAVISON, City Clerk. A By-law Respecting the Sale of Meat. Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows: 1. Every person publicly selling meat (fresh, salted or corned) by retail within this city in any store, shop, house, warehouse or other building or in the public market building or in or from any meat wagon, cart, carriage, sleigh or other vehicle upon the public streets or highways of the said City by retail in less quantities than by the carcass, shall obtain from the Mayor thereof a License as a meat Vendor, and the Mayor is hereby authorized to issue such License upon receiving the License fee hereinafter mentioned. 2. The License fee shall be Twenty-five dollars. 3. No person shall expose for sale or publicly sell fresh, salted or corned meat by retail in any store, shop, house, warehouse or other building or place or in the public market building, or in or from any meat wagon, cart, carriage, sleigh or other vehicle within the said City, without having first obtained a License therefor in manner above mentioned. 4. Any person or persons guilty of any infraction of any of the Provisions of this By-law, shall, upon conviction before the Stipendiary Magistrate on oath or affirmation of a credible witness, forfeit and pay at the discretion of the Stipendiary Magistrate a penalty not exceeding the sum of Thirty Dollars for each offence, exclusive of costs, and in default of payment thereof it shall and may be lawful for the said Stipendiary Magistrate to commit the offender to the Common Jail of the County of Queen's County for any period not exceeding thirty days, unless the said penalty and costs be sooner paid. Provided always that nothing in this By-law contained shall be construed to prevent persons from selling meat by the quart on the public or market square adjoining the market building without such license, but all persons shall have the right thereon to sell meat of all kinds by the quart on payment of the usual market tolls as at present or at any time hereafter may be provided. And Provided further that nothing herein contained shall be construed to require persons selling tinned or canned meats poultry or game to take out the License above mentioned. JAMES WARBURTON, M.
