Lobstermen Report Loss Of Gear During Monday's Storm

Lobster fishermen in the Malpeque, Darnley, Sea View areas, with lobster traps close to shore suffered extensive damage from Monday's high winds when traps, buoys and rope were washed ashore and in some cases smashed by the boiling surf.

Fisheries Officer Norman MacLeod said last night that it would probably take a week or more for many of the fishermen to repair their traps and get them in shape again for fishing. Much of the gear, he said, drifted away from its location, causing confusion to fishermen in locating their own equipment when it was found later washed up on shore. Some of the smaller fishermen suffered quite extensive damage from a recent blow Mr. MacLeod stated and were just getting back to normal when Monday's storm came to further aggravate a very unhappy situation.

Damage to fishing gear which was located well outside the shore area is reported to be almost negligible.

At a recent meeting in Kinkora school, the teachers of the area were unanimous in their decision that a Royal Commission is needed to study the problems of education in this Province.

Some of the suggestions which were brought forward were as follows: Payments might be made to teachers at the end of each of the twelve months, or at least a payment at the end of August. A letter, directed through the proper channels, could be read at the annual school meeting, bringing to the attention of the ratepayers, the uses in the educational system, the inconveniences of schools and inadequacy of equipment. It was suggested that a Commission might enforce a standard requirement in this matter.

As children are often without money to buy the necessary books,

A Commission might look into the matter of family allowances and find out how they are being spent. Because of the shortage of teachers a Certificate board would be found workable just now, but the group thought that it would be advisable for the future and that teachers should certainly be on this board.

Workshops would be very valuable established on a local level, where teachers' problems would be discussed and results of meetings published. It was suggested that a panel discussion among several districts might arouse more interest on the part of ratepayers and even teachers.

It was the opinion of the group that the shortage of teachers on P.E.I. is not all due to the low and poorly arranged payment of salaries, but also to the inconveniences of boarding houses, to the lack of proper working materials, and to the disinterestedness of parents. It was also felt that if teaching is to retain the status of a profession, a higher academic training must be required of Normal School graduates, and higher salaries paid to compensate for the extra years of training.

East Prince Credit Union Chapter Meets

The regular monthly meeting of the East Prince Credit Union Chapter was held in Miscouche Hall on May 23rd with Mr. Martin DesRoches of Miscouche Credit Union as chairman and Mr. Everett Turtur of Abegweit Credit Union at Seven Mile Bay as secretary.

The main topic for discussion was "Assistance in reviving weak Credit Unions". The chapter placed itself on record as being willing to help in any way possible.

Two resolutions were passed to be presented to the P. E. I. Credit Union League annual convention on June 20th.

Mr. Leo Conroy, managing director of the League was present and explained the set up of the new Credit Union office in Charlottetown and gave some interesting highlights on the CUNA meeting in Madison, Wisconsin which he attended.

It was announced that the local candidate for director of CUNA, the Rev. J.D. Nelson MacDonald of Dartmouth, N.S. had been elected.

Mr. Keir Duggan, president of the P.E.I. Credit Union League spoke briefly on the activities of the League. At the conclusion of the meeting two films "Kings X" and "Forgive Us Our Debts" were shown.

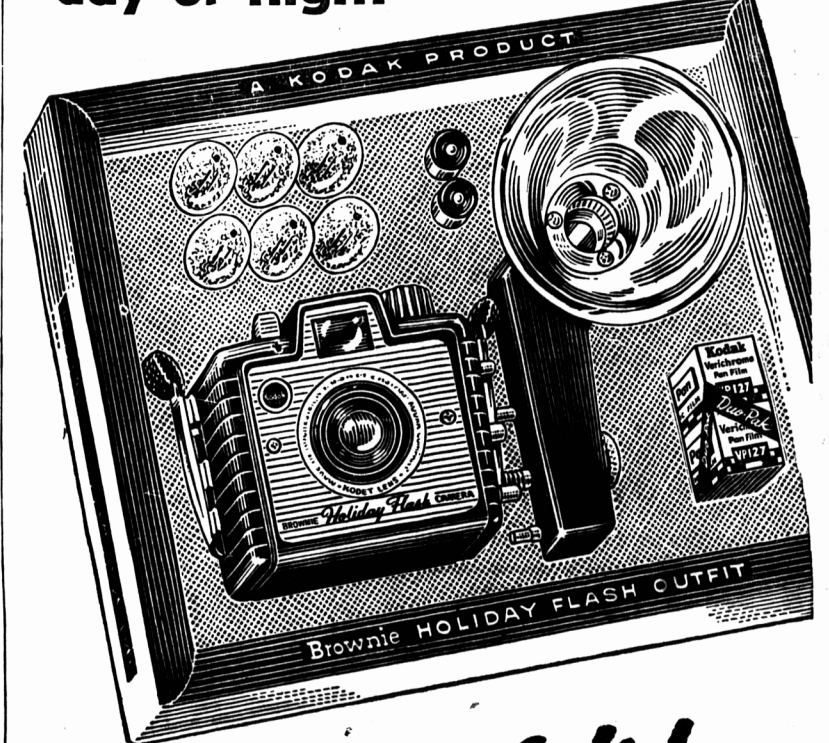
