Mr. and Mrs. J.F. MacNeill of Summerside celebrated their 36 Wedding Anniversary on Wednesday.

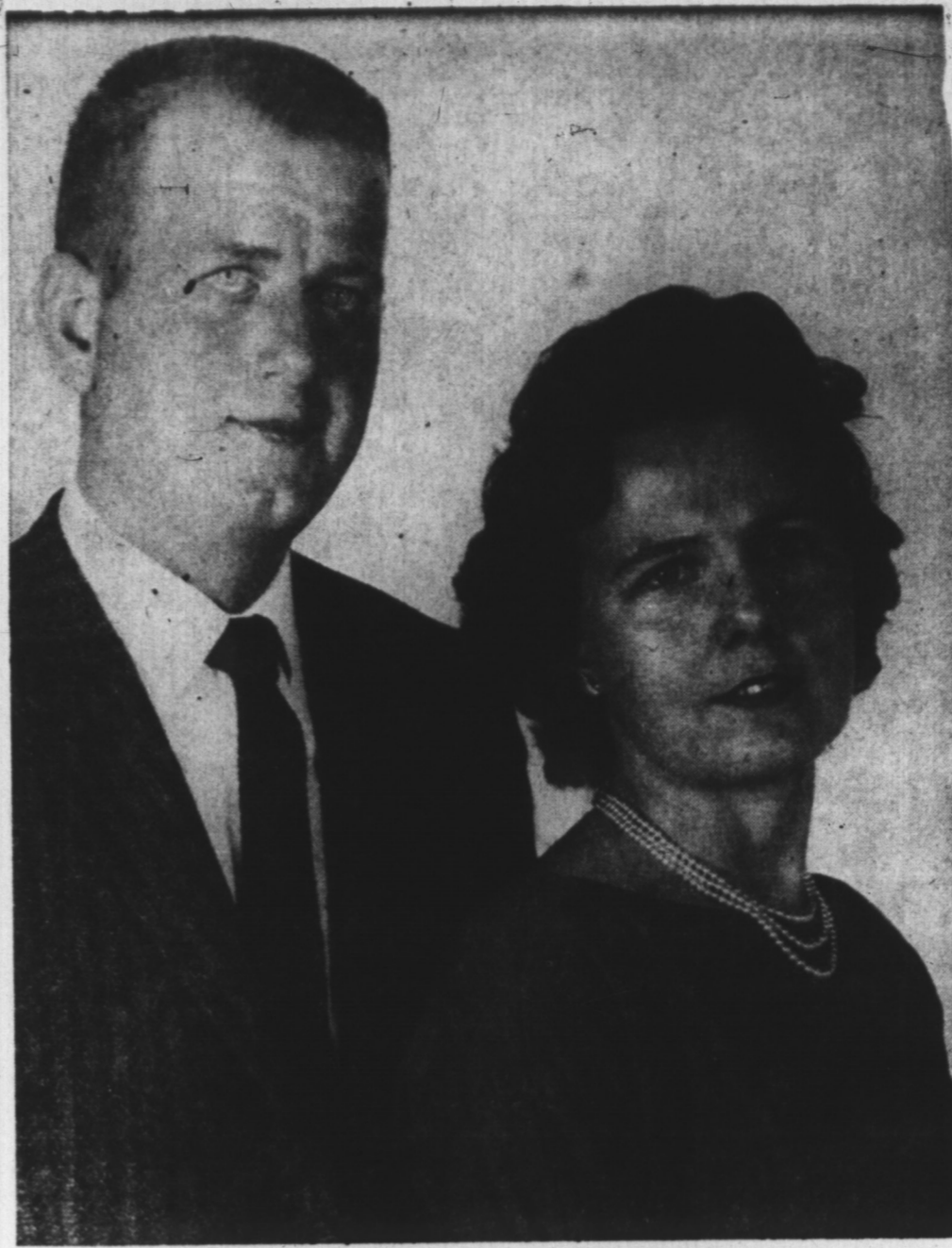
