TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

LONDON, Feb. 27. The Telegraph publishes the following prominently:—The belief prevailed in political circles yesterday evening that owing to the action of the Lords, concerning the investigation of the Land Act operations, and consequently Government difficulty in Ireland, Gladstone has determined to resign.

Lord Cairns has been appointed Chairman of the Committee to inquire into the working of the Land Act, in place of the Duke of Somerset, who is unwell.

Gladstone has invited his supporters to meet at his residence to-day, to obtain their opinion on the course to be pursued in regard to the House of Lords' committee of inquiry.

LONDON, Feb. 26. A despatch to the "Standard," from Vienna, reports that by an explosion in a coal mine at Leoben, in Styria, 150 persons have been killed, so far as ascertainable.

OTTAWA, Feb. 25. L. B. Woodworth is very ill with quinsy. The skating and tobogganing party, at Rideau Hall last evening was a most brilliant affair.

The toboggan slides, rink and grounds were illuminated with 1000 Chinese lanterns, presenting a brilliant spectacle. Col. and Mrs. Laurie have reached here from British Columbia.

The budget debate will be resumed on Tuesday.

GRAND FALLS, N. B., Feb. 26. Considerable excitement prevails here over the arrival at Siene, Denmark, of a family of Danes infected with the small-pox.
