

Tanker Shortage Is Big Factor In Non-Suez Route

LONDON (Reuters) — Shortage of tankers for the longer haul rather than the extra cost is the major problem in replacing the Suez Canal with the Cape of Good Hope route, oil experts said here Tuesday.

They explained that if all the oil that now comes to Western Europe and the eastern United States through the Suez had to be diverted around the southern tip of Africa, it would require about 55 per cent more tanker capacity. In the short run, this could be found, or replaced, by a series of improvisations.

The present tanker fleet could be driven harder and it could be augmented moderately from the United States "mothball" fleet and other sources.

ONLY POSSIBLE SOURCE

The Middle-East oil could be replaced for a time by oil from the western hemisphere. The necessary oil does exist in the United States and Venezuela and the haul from there to Western Europe is actually shorter than the Suez route from the Middle East.

But over the long run the canal, which Egyptian President Nasser nationalized in July, is both indispensable and inadequate.

The trouble is not the amount of "Middle-East oil that Europe uses now but the immensely greater amount that is going to be needed in the next few years.

With the stagnation of coal output, oil has to meet almost the whole of the increase in the demand for energy until the atomic era arrives. Over any period of years, the Middle East appears to be the only possible source of the extra oil.

COSTLY BY CAPE

Last year, 67,000,000 tons of oil came through the canal. On conservative estimates, it might have to be 150,000,000 by 1955 and 350,000,000 by 1975.

Building and financing the tankers and other facilities for this colossal expansion is a herculean task, even by the shortest routes. Doing for the Cape route, which is nearly twice as long, would be immensely costly.

Since the existing program strains the capacity of the world's shipyards, which are booked fully up to 1960, a larger program would at best take many years.

Unsatisfactory School Attendance Results In Lost Family Allowance

In the month of August 1956, \$222,433 was paid in Family Allowances to 13,347 Prince Edward Island families on behalf of 36,376 children. The average allowance per child was \$6.12 and the average allowance per family was \$16.79, Mr. A.S. Tait, Regional Director of Family Allowances said in an interview yesterday.

During the school year which ended on June 30th last, 345 parents lost one month or more Family Allowances on account of their children's unsatisfactory school attendance.

Under the Family Allowances legislation, the allowance ceases to be payable if the child does not regularly attend school as required by the laws of the province where the child resides. The Regional offices has a working arrangement with the Department of Education office through its Provincial School Attendance Officer to receive monthly reports of all cases of unsatisfactory school attendance. These reports reach the Regional office any time after the end of the month in which the irregular attendance occurred. When the reports are received in the Regional office, payments on behalf of the children reported

are stopped beginning with the current month and recoveries from the parents' accounts are made for any of the past months of unsatisfactory attendance.

The parent has an obligation under the existing Family Allowances legislation to report within one month to the Regional Director when a child, who is of school age, does not regularly attend school as required by the Provincial school laws. The Regional Director therefore urges parents in this Province to report immediately to the Regional office whenever a child under fifteen ceases to attend school. Other reasons necessitating a parent to advise the Regional Director is when a child under sixteen dies, a child leaves Canada for any period over one month, a female child marries, a child leaves a parent's care or commences to work for wages. Prompt action on the part of the parent who is in receipt of allowance, in sending the required report to the office of the Regional Director of Family Allowances, the necessity of recovering allowances paid on behalf of a child which the parent was not entitled to receive.

Following a solo "Spirit of God descend upon my heart," by Mrs. Frances MacRae, Rev. Dr. E. J. Barras, of Trion United Baptist Church, welcomed Rev. Arthur Moore to the ministry. Benediction was pronounced by Rev. Dr. Moore.

Lt.-Gen. Simonds In Comment On Interview Given By Meyer

OTTAWA (CP) — Lt.-Gen. Guy Simonds, former chief of the Canadian Army general staff, said Thursday he has always believed that German General Kurt Meyer would have had knowledge of the shooting of Canadian war prisoners for which he served nine years in prison in Canada.

Gen. Simonds was commenting on an interview with the former German divisional commander in which Meyer said he should not have been tried or convicted of responsibility for the 1944 mass execution of 18 Canadian prisoners by his men.

Meyer, now a civilian, was convicted after the war as a war criminal. He served part of a life term at Dorchester penitentiary in New Brunswick and was released two years ago.

POLITICAL DECISION

Gen. Simonds, who commanded the 2nd Canadian Corps in the Normandy campaign and retired a year ago as chief of the general staff, said of Meyer's claim that he never should have been tried:

"The answer is simple. The decision was a political, and not a military, one. I presume the same thing would have applied had the Germans won."

Of Meyer's claim that prisoners were shot by both sides during the Normandy invasion, Gen. Simonds said he never had any knowledge of the Allies doing this.

LOST OPPORTUNITY

He added that he has always doubted that, in the swirl of a fast-moving battle, Meyer would have had knowledge of shootings conducted by lower ranks.

Of Meyer's criticism of British and Canadian generalship, Gen. Simonds said the Panzer division chief was not in a particularly good position to assess this at the time of the Falaise pocket fighting because his own unit was on the run.

However, he said that in his opinion after the Falaise battle the Allies lost a great opportunity, partly as a result of a series of command changes.
