LIBERAL-CONSERVATIVE POLICY.

At Summerside Sir Louis and Mr Blair declared that the Liberal Conservatives have no policy! This is false. They have a right to the National Policy which they inaugurated and which is now administered by their opponents. As well might the men in office argue that if a man by deception gets the owner of a house out and he step in, the house is his and the owner has no right to assert his claim to the house. The Court of Appeal is the election. The Conservatives rightly hold their title to the National Policy. The Liberals opposed it, and promised to do away with it. Yet, in power, their argument is, "we are here and you are there!" They call the argument before the Court of Appeal "abuse," and would gladly obliterate their past speeches if they could. Sir Louis Davies said they would remove the specific duties! Did they do it? Did they remove the duty on kerosene oil? They raised it on tobacco, they raised it on carpets to 35 per cent; grey cottons from 22 1/2 to 25 per cent; printed cottons from 30 to 35 per cent; sewing cotton from 12 1/2 to 15; woolen cloth, 35 per cent. This is what they call "revenue" tariff; but it means higher protection. It is high time to hold the Liberals and all politicians to their public declarations and now is the time to turn the usurpers out.

Then they have—in addition to the National Policy which Sir Wilfrid Laurier before the election appropriated, and after the election deliberately repudiated—the policy of Mutual Preferential Trade. We maintain, as Sir Wilfrid Laurier maintained, before the election, that there are in this policy, "immense possibilities" for Canada, and particularly for Prince Edward Island; and we shall proceed, ere long, to demonstrate the fact.

THE SURPLUS.

The Liberal leaders and their organs make much of the fact that the surplus at the end of last year was \$7,940,392. After all this amount is only a little more than the Liberal Conservative surplus of 1893, when the government obtained \$15,133,291 less revenue! Had the Liberals kept their expenditures down to the Liberal-Conservative standard they would have had from their present protective tariff and other source, a surplus of \$13,978,799 instead of one of \$7,940,392!

Taking one year with another, the expenditure out of the Consolidated Fund was about the same—there was little if any increase—throughout the last Parliamentary term in which the Conservatives were in office. But since the Liberals came in and obtained control of the public exchequer it has gone up by leaps and bounds. If it had increased at the rate of a million a year—the surplus of last year would have been upwards of \$10,900,000 instead of only \$7,000,000.

But the Liberal leaders, it will be remembered, promised to reduce expenditures by three or four millions a year. If this had been done the surplus of last year would have been, not \$7,900,000, but about \$18,000,000, and the public debt would have been by so much reduced!

The Liberal leaders have had a great opportunity in the commercial activity of the past four years. But they have failed to turn it to the advantage of the country.

—The Canadian Military Gazette, a thoroughly independent paper, puts the matter about right when it says: The unstinted praise the returning members of the first contingent bestowed upon Lieut.-Col. Pelletier, Major Peltier and Dr. Fiset is most pleasing to The Military Gazette and other papers which always believed that the French-Canadians were ready to and would do their duty on every occasion. It was the unfortunate personal opinion of Sir Wilfrid Laurier himself to our taking any hand in Britain's wars that made the French unpopular in the English Provinces.

—The Mail and Empire remarks that on the great question of conserving our industrial interests, the ruling faction finds itself between two stools. One of its organs tells us it is beset with critics, who attack it from opposite sides. Some think that the tariff ought to be higher. On the other hand, "others complain that the reductions were not sufficiently drastic and that the new tariff is too much like the old." Admittedly it is an awkward situation, for, in the attempt to please everybody, nobody has been satisfied.

OBITUARY.

At St. George's, King's County on Monday, Sept. 3rd, at 2 a. m., Elizabeth McPhee, beloved wife of Laughlin McDonald. The deceased was born at Burnt Point, Georgetown Royalty, eighty-three years ago. At the age of twenty-six she married, and lived from that time till her death at St. George's. She was well-known, good and kind-hearted, and was much esteemed by all who knew her. Her husband survives her at the advanced age of ninety. They were among the earliest settlers of St. George's, and together underwent and saw much of the hardships of pioneer life. A family of five daughters and two sons survive. Two of the daughters, Katie and Mrs. Hugh McDonald, and one son, Hugh, reside in the United States. A son and daughter, Stephen and Eugenia, reside on the old home stead. The deceased lady was buried in the Catholic Cemetery at St. George's on the morning of Wednesday, Sept. 5th. The funeral cortege was large, many having come from a distance to pay the last tribute of respect to a worthy woman.

A GROWING TIME.

The Minister of Finance last week made known for the first time how much money he had spent in the fiscal year ending two months ago. The amount was only \$50,627,941. The amount charged to the ordinary services of the country was \$42,937,549. This does not include capital account, nor railway subsidies nor any part of the cost of the South Africa contingent. Here is a comparison of Mr. Fielding's four years expenditure on current account with that of Mr. Foster's last four years:

Mr. Fielding claims a surplus of \$7,790,000. Mr. Foster's surplus in 1893 was \$7,064,000. Mr. Fielding has three-quarters of a million more left over than Mr. Foster had seventeen years ago. But Mr. Fielding taxed the people eight millions more in 1900 than Mr. Foster did in 1883;—St. John Sun.

The Canadian Churchman of last week contains the following paragraph under its Ottawa News heading: "A handsome brass tablet in memory of the late Mr. Allan N. McNeill has been set up in St. Stephen's church by the congregation. The memorial service on the occasion of the unveiling of the same was held on Sunday afternoon, July 1, and was well attended. Rev. Canon Pollard officiated at the service and was assisted by Rev. Mr. Steacy. In addition to the saying of prayers, appropriate hymns were sung and selections on the organ were given by Mr. E. Steele. Mrs. McNeill, widow of the late Mr. A. N. McNeill, together with her family, desires to express thanks to the members of the congregation of St. Stephen's church who arranged for the erection of the tablet, which bears the following inscription: 'In memory of Allan N. McNeill, B. N., through whose efforts this church was built, born November 29, 1846, died November 16, 1898.' It is placed on the left hand side of the chancel over the organ."

In the official recount of the birth-rate in Montreal, one striking fact stands out prominently; the average birth-rate in French-Canadian families is 43.55 in the thousand; among Catholics of other origins, 20.81, and 22.29 among Protestants. When Mr. Tarte predicted that the time would come when the French-Canadians would form a majority of the population of Canada, people shrugged their shoulders in incredulity. But these figures demonstrate that, if the birth-rate were alone to settle the question, the eventual coming of the event would be a simple matter of arithmetic. From political or race considerations, no change need be expected. It is mere self-delusion to quibble about the causes; they are well known. Is this state of things to continue? There is high medical authority for saying that married women, of child-bearing age, not condemned by nature to sterility, who fail to become mothers once in three years, as a rule, pay the penalty of artificial sterility in confirmed ill-health. When this becomes thoroughly understood, a change may come.
