Federal Govt. Paying Biggest Share, MP Says

MOUNT STEWART — "The Diefenbaker government is paying 90 cents of every dollar that is spent on the Hillsboro causeway," declared Hon. J. Angus MacLean, P.E.I. representative in the federal cabinet. This statement was made last night before a capacity audience at the Mt. Stewart Hall at a meeting of Third District of Queens' electors.

Chairman for the meeting was Leith Brown. Also speaking were the candidates for the district, J. Russell Driscoll and Andrew MacRae. Senator J.J. Macdonald, Walter Shaw and John A. Macdonald, M.P.

Mr. MacLean emphasized the federal government's participation in the Trans-Canada Highway construction, as well as the Roads to Resources program. He also pointed out that a new ice-breaking ferry is to be built for the Borden-Cape Tormentine run by the federal government.

SURVEYS NECESSARY

More detailed surveys were being made of the feasibility of the causeway and added that this would be one of the greatest engineering feats in Canada, and therefore a great many surveys would be needed.

Mr. MacLean asked "whether the people of this province are satisfied with the present, old tired government which despite all statements to the contrary is 24 years old?" He declared that they were capable of changing their political thinking. He found a similarity between the hospital insurance plan debate in the provincial legislature and the pipeline debate in the House of Commons of a few years back in which "the brass simply forgot about the grass."

In conclusion he urged the thoughtful and politically-wise voters of Prince Edward Island to vote Progressive Conservative. J. Russell Driscoll in talking about the hospital insurance plan pointed out that the Liberal government agreed to the federal hospital plan as proposed by the former Liberal federal govern-

ment without even knowing where the money was coming from to pay for it.

Through special adjustment grants, Prime Minister Diefenbaker has made it possible for the province to pay its share of the hospital scheme, he declared.

He pointed out that the cost of shipping potatoes from the Island to Boston or Montreal is now 33 per cent lower through the federal assistance on freight rates for such Island products.

BUTTERFAT CONTENT

Andrew B. MacRae declared that the Conservative government when elected will enact legislation whereby all milk and cream will be sold to dairies creameries cheese factories and processing plants on the basis of their butterfat content as determined by government appointed inspectors.

He also suggested that among the many beauty spots in Kings County it would be highly possible to establish a new national park.

Provincial party leader Walter R. Shaw emphasized that the new federal farm loan policy now included farmers up to the age of 41 — an increase which would enable farmers to help establish their sons on farms. He declared that the potato flake plant which the Premier has been talking about has already been set up in Alliston, Ont. He also wondered about the wisdom of trying to grow tobacco on a private farm in P.E.I. instead of an Experimental Farm as in Nova Scotia.

Bee Causes Truck Crash

SUMMERSIDE — A large 1959 GMC truck with wooden body loaded with ten tons of sand went crashing through a culvert at a private driveway in Miscouche yesterday afternoon to wind up in a badly smashed condition but with the driver uninjured.

Eric Gallant was driving through the village on the road to Lot 16 when a bumblebee settled on his arm. He kept on driving but when it crawled up on his face he swatted it. As he did the big truck swerved, ripped out one section of the culvert and ploughed through the roadside ditch. It almost crawled up on the lawn in front of the home of Philip LeClair.

The frame of the truck was badly battered and twisted and the huge body was snapped clean off to come to rest in the ditch alongside.

The chassis was finally hauled out last evening by another truck. The damaged vehicle is reported owned by Edward Arsenault, Wellington.

The bumblebee is dead. The cause of the accident died just prior to the crash as Gallant's aim was true when he swatted it.

A driveway he turned west toward St. Eleanors. He proceeded on his right side of the road until after meeting a gravel truck, when he apparently decided to turn around and go back.

According to eye witness reports his attention was apparently attracted to something to his right, but he nevertheless started to make a left turn into the centre of the road apparently unaware that a panel truck driven by Errol Laughlin, Sherbrooke was approaching.

The truck struck the bike a glancing blow after Mr. Laughlin applied his brakes and veered to avoid a collision. Fortunately the youth fell on the shoulder of the road rather than the pavement.

Last night Buddy was reported as resting comfortably in hospital. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Cameron.

Larkin Remanded On Break Charge

SUMMERSIDE — No plea was taken when William Wendell Larkin, Charlottetown, appeared in Summerside police court yesterday on charges of breaking into the stores of Athol Cotton and MacKenzie's Ltd., in Kensington. Larkin was remanded to Monday without bail.

The breaks are alleged to have occurred on Aug. 3rd when the town police officer, Vernon Reeves, surprised two men in the act of hoarding a car with goods from the two stores. The car later proved to be a stolen one from Montague.

The two men escaped from the clutches of the town constable and were the subject of a large-scale search by police and local citizens. Larkin was arrested while attempting to thumb a ride a few miles from the scene of the breaks.

He was first charged with carrying an offensive weapon, a pocket knife, but this charge was dismissed by Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, Q.C., in Queens County Magistrate's Court for lack of evidence of intent on the part of the accused. He was promptly arrested on the break, entry and theft charges by RCMP officers at the conclusion of the Charlottetown court session and taken to Summerside, where he appeared yesterday.
