**PEOPLE ARE DESTITUTE.**—A St. John's Nfld., despatch says: The whole north-west coast of this island has been blocked with ice for the last six weeks, the result being that navigation along the coast has been practically impossible. The people in many sections are now destitute of provision, owing to inability to replace their supplies, and the commercial operations of almost 80,000 people have been virtually suspended. Fishing outfitting for Labrador and the off-shore fishing grounds will be quite out of the question until the ice blockade is raised.

## COMMENTS ON COSTIGAN.

Incidentally, in the course of his remarks upon Hon. Mr. Costigan's apology for his desertion of the Liberal Conservative party, Sir Charles Tupper remarked that he had not enjoyed many opportunities to assist Mr. Costigan in his mission on behalf of the Irish Catholic, but he had recommended the appointment of the first Roman Catholic ever appointed to the bench and the first ever appointed governor of his province.

Mr. Ross Robertson commented briefly on Mr. Costigan's reference to him and his paper, observing that he was willing to be held responsible for all that he said in the house and out of it. Mr. Costigan's own statement, which showed that he had no defence, was a sufficient justification for what the Toronto Telegram has said, and what it would say hereafter. He was himself an admirer of the Irish race, and therefore would strive to forget that Mr. Costigan had ever been an Irish leader. He was lacking in one quality of the Irish people—that of faithfulness. He hoped the member of Victoria would live long, and he ventured to say that when he died his epitaph would be: "Here lies a conservative who was faithful to the conservative party so long as it was on a divided paying basis."

FROM MONTREAL.—The steamer Bonavisa arrived from Montreal about nine o'clock last night, bringing a large cargo. She left this afternoon for St. John's via Sydney. Her outward cargo included 103 cattle, 8 horses, 40 sheep, 1000 bags oats and 500 bags potatoes.

FUNERAL YESTERDAY.—The funeral of the late John Andrew Macdonald took place yesterday afternoon, and the attendance of mourning citizens was very large. The pall was borne by Chief Justice Sullivan, F. De. St. C. Brecken, Theo. Moore, S. C. Nash, James Redlin and John Carroll. The Caledonian Club, of which the deceased had been a prominent member for years, attended in a body. The interment was in the Roman Catholic Cemetery. The services at the church and at the grave were taken by Rev. Dr. Morrison.

SUDDEN DEATH.—Mrs. McLean, widow of Captain John McLean, departed this life yesterday morning. Mrs. McLean was in her usual health on Saturday, and retired at night apparently all right. About one o'clock on Sunday morning she complained of being ill, and a doctor was summoned and her sister was sent for. These were quickly on the scene and everything possible was done for Mrs. McLean. But the shadow of death was upon her, and in less than an hour from the first intimation of her illness her spirit passed away. Heart failure was the cause of death. Mrs. McLean was well and favorably known, and her death will be sorely mourned. She has a daughter in Boston and a son in California. Mrs. William Chandler and Mrs. Geo. Stanley are sisters of the deceased. Captain McLean, it will be remembered, died suddenly at Picton some years ago.

THE RIFLE.—The league match was started on Saturday, but owing to the hard rain had to be discontinued. This match will be finished through the week or on next Saturday when the second match takes place. The Charlottetown Engineers have two teams in the League and the Provincial Association also have teams. We notice that members of teams entered from military corps have certain privileges in the D. 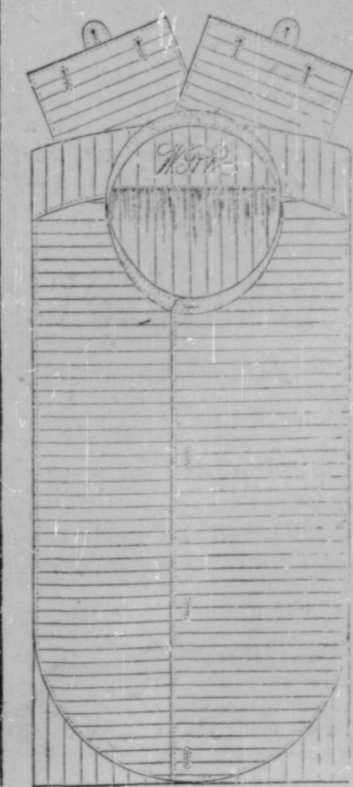
