THE export trade in hay from the province of Quebec is a much more valuable one than is generally supposed. Between the 1st of September, 1880, and the 1st July, 1881, one hundred thousand tons were exported, the value being \$1,250,000.

BUSINESS MATTERS.—In sugar, Scotch refined is pretty well out of the market, coarse sugar having been imported since the Montreal refinery commenced operations. The market remains pretty steady, with a slightly easier tendency on the part of refiners, but future prices will depend on the stock of raw sugars offering in the markets.—Sun.

EXCURSIONISTS from the United States and the Upper Provinces are beginning to arrive here in large numbers, and it is expected that the Island will, this season, be visited by a great number of Americans and Canadians who hitherto spent the hot sea on at Saratoga and other well known watering places. The arrival of tourists and others at the Rankin House alone, last evening, numbered forty-six persons.

CUR-TAILED.—A few days ago a dog visited Mr. Disney's farm on North River with the evident intention of killing sheep. Mr. D. appeared promptly on the scene with gun in hand, and on discharging one barrel, and on being found that he had successfully cur-tailed "the intruder." The tail was fully cur-tailed, and in the sheep field, but the canine had not since.

THE Fifth Avenue Theatre Co. open for a short season at the Academy of Music to-night. The "Banker's Daughter," a play which is highly praised by the press of Halifax, will be produced. This Company is a large and a good one, and while in Halifax was patronized by the Marquis of Lorne and the Commander of Her Majesty's forces. We bespeak for them a good season here.

TWO MEN DROWNED WHILE FISHING.—Capt. Huskins, of the schr. "Dart" arrived at Camp, N. S., on Sunday, reports that on Monday, 4th inst., while tending trawls, a dory, containing two men, William Reynolds, of Camp, and James Baiker, of Guysboro, was capsized and drowned before assistance reached them. Reynolds leaves a wife and several children. Baiker was unmarried.

THE Stipendiary Magistrate should be highly commended for his efforts in clearing the city of nuisances, in the shape of filthy yards and out-houses. Yesterday two citizens were fined twenty dollars each, under the Nuisance Act, and to-day two others were fined five dollars each. If fines like these continue to be imposed, it would doubly pay some citizens to keep their yards and out-houses thoroughly cleaned.

MR. HENRY CHOWAN, of Malpeque Road, brought to this city to-day the remains of four sheep, killed by dogs on his farm, this morning. Mr. Chowan states that his flock was attacked by two large ferocious dogs early this morning. Four sheep were killed outright, two more fatally wounded, while two others were horribly maimed. The dogs were shot and killed. Their owners are well known, and Mr. Chowan will sue the owners of these dogs for the damage done to his flock.

THE Temperance Convention which meets in this city on Tuesday next, the 19th, seems to be most opportune. All good citizens are anxious that the new law, to come in force next month, shall be enforced and respected. We trust the convention will result in substantial and permanent good. All persons who have received circulars will remember that as Tuesday is market day the convention will be held in Full's Hall, and not in Market Hall. The public meeting at night will be held in the Market Hall.
