

Police Question Hinders / Inquiries For Horse

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Negro baseball star Willie Mays' top \$37,500 home Thursday night after a hectic day in which race issues raised by the people who will be his new neighbors were overcome.

"I had several other offers but Willie said the first one was the best," Walter A. Giesler, the city zoning administrator, said.

"The opposition from neighbors is practically all over some people just don't understand."

Giesler said earlier he had turned down Mays because heavy pressure was put on him from the neighborhood.

The area activists exclude St. Francis Wood in the western San Francisco hills, with a fine view over the ocean.

"The people of San Francisco want him to live here so we added to the list 'have it,'" the owner said.

A city Thursday's disclosure that Mays' offer to buy had been rejected because of his color.

"The city zoning administrator told the baseball player's difficulties," Giesler said. "He was afraid that if he sold to a Negro in this all-white neighborhood he might be denied work. He is a small scale home builder."

Mays said he hopes to complete the deal at once. He said he plans to return to New York with his wife in a few days to dispose of the home they own there.

MAYS, WIFE UPSET

Mays and his wife had been badly upset by the incident, which she said was their second such turnaround in San Francisco since the Giants moved to the West Coast.

Mayor George Christopher outpraised a personal regrets to the Mays and invited them to stay as his guests in his home until they found suitable housing.

Mays took the issue far more philosophically than did city officials. But he had some strong-

comment.

"It is worse than down South, where you know who you stand and there are signs to go by," said Henry Ross, a brilliant attorney who said that "this sort of thing makes us look in the eyes of the world. I would like to think I am a colored boy, that I could buy and live where I want."

"I'd like to live in San Francisco, but I didn't want to make an issue of it. I've never been through this sort of thing before. I sure looked bad for our country."

Walker singled out three players he thought had played a crucial role in the victory against the Rough Riders—fullback Pat Abbruzzo, defences Doug McNeil and lineman Norm Hudson.

Russians To Arrive Wed.

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Russian Olympic team is scheduled to arrive in Montreal by plane early on Wednesday, Secretary of State George D. Humphrey said Thursday. The CIAA is sponsoring the Russian's seven-game exhibition tour in Ontario and Quebec.

The Russians are scheduled to leave Moscow Sunday aboard a Scandinavian Airlines jet for a flight for Stockholm. The team will fly immediately from Stockholm to Copenhagen, spending Sunday night there and leaving Monday for Copenhagen.

They are due at Gander, Nfld., on Nov. 19, and at St. John's, N.S. on Nov. 19 and will leave at 5:05 p.m. on Trans-Canada Air Lines flight to Montreal. They are due in Montreal at 12:05 a.m. EST.

The Russians are due in Toronto by train from Montreal at 8 a.m. EST, Wednesday. They open the tour at 10:30 a.m. on Nov. 22, against Whitby Dunlops. Canada's representatives in the World amateur championships at Oslo next February.

NEW YORK (AP) — It's an odd situation when the best goalies in the National Hockey League are in imminent danger of being sent to the minors.

But this disturbing possibility is being faced by Gump Worsley, who until he was sidelined by a pulled thigh muscle Oct. 31, had the best record among the netminders in ice hockey's major circuit.

The decision to send to play Worsley in Wednesday night's game against the Chicago Black Hawks will be made today.

"We'll see how Gump looks in practice," said coach Paul Walston. "If he doesn't look fresh, we'll bring up Marcel Paille again and maybe watch Worsley's Providence to get in shape."

BIG HELP TO TEAM

Paille was in the nets in each of the five games the Rangers played on his successful road trip. The 26-year-old French-Canadian youngsters gave up only 10 goals while the Rangers won in four of five.

Following New York's 5-0 net win by Chicago Saturday, a nationally televised game, Paille was sent back to Providence. He had a 1-0-1 record in 11 appearances in 22 American Hockey League ice Sunday night.

"The only thing Paille lacks is experience," said Walston. "He has one of his big reasons we need such a fine road trip."

Urges Changes In Air Defence

HAMILTON (CP) — Canada's air defence program was branded as "obsolete and useless" by Lieutenant General G.D. Simonds in Hamilton Wednesday night.

And the Second World War military commander demanded that the West- and Canada in particular — change its permanent policy immediately — before the Russians moved even further ahead.

Hundreds of millions of dollars had been wasted in this country's department of national defence in its development of the supersonic delta winged fighter CF-105, Lieutenant General Simonds declared.

By the time the Canadian fighter got into mass production, he would be rendered "utterly useless" against the Soviet ballistic missiles, he asserted.

Election Cost \$6,991,822

OTTAWA (CP) — The June 10 general election cost the federal treasury a record \$6,991,822, State Secretary F.C. Parrinello reported today in a tabled Commons reply.

This compared with bills of \$5,325,280 and \$4,446,677 for the 1953 and 1950 general elections, respectively. In 1950, when the present election system was instituted, the cost was \$2,127,885.

These figures do not include the \$601 million in advertising expected to be tabled later this session.

UNEF GETS QUARTERS

CAIRO (AP)—Maj-Gen. E. L. M. Burns of Canada will attend the inaugural meeting of the United Nations Emergency Force leave centre here today. An estimated 200 UNEF soldiers are expected to visit the centre each week.

Is Critical Of Ship Transfer

OTTAWA (CP) — C. E. Johnson (SC — Bow River) said in the Commons Thursday that government support for Canadian National Steamship's transfer of registry to Trinidad, from Canada, for its West Indies Service "smacks very loudly of what we did in the hungry '30s."

Speaking in a Commons throne speech debate, Mr. Johnson said the steamship company's transfer of registry was to enable it to meet a demand from its employees for higher wages.

The company would get plenty of cheap labor in Trinidad to meet its needs, he said.

"But here we have the government of this country saying in effect that if workers don't accept lower standards of living then we will go foreigners to take their jobs."

"That is not solution. The result will be that most of these people (the steamship employees) will be thrown out of work, their standard of living will be reduced, and many will be buying less consumer goods — leading only to more unemployment."

PAKISTAN STRIKE ENDS

DACCAR, Pakistan (Reuters) — Some 20,000 workers in more than 60 state firms agreed Thursday to end a 12-day strike after employers promised them better working conditions and increased pay.

TORONTO (CP) — Campaign chairman J. S. Killip said Thursday Metropolitan Toronto closed its united appeal's two-week "unofficial overtime" with a total of \$5,325,722. This is 92.2 per cent, \$90,720 short of the appeal's \$5,726,442 objective. Toronto's campaign officially ended Oct. 31 with returns of \$7,366,612 extending to a group of 61 volunteer workers.
