

Cobey McCloskey And Yvon Durelle Sign For Bout At Forum May 22

Maritime middleweight champion, Cobey McCloskey of Charlottetown, and ex-champion Yvon Durelle of Baie Ste. Anne, N.B., will meet here at the Forum on May 22nd in a 10-round, non-title bout as the main attraction of a top-notch boxing card it was announced here last night by Forum manager W. J. "Bill" Brown.

Manager Brown stated last night that Durelle consented to the match and that final arrangements were concluded yesterday for the big bout. Neither boxer is expected to be able to trim down to the 160 pound weight limit, so it will be a non-title affair.

The two top-ranking middleweights in the Maritimes at the present time, the McCloskey-Durelle match has all the possibilities of being one of the smartest bouts to be witnessed in a local ring for some time.

Other smart bouts are also being arranged for to make it a stellar boxing attraction for Island boxing fans.

Island welterweight titleholder, Harry "Kid" Poulton will meet Harold Schultz of Dartmouth in a six-round semi-final attraction while at least two other high-class four-round preliminaries, made up from local talent, will complete the card. There is also a possibility that a special six-round feature will be added to make it a star-studded night of boxing entertainment.

McCloskey, who lost a 12-round decision to Durelle last November, lifted the crown from the Baie Ste. Anne middleweight by a split decision at Springhill in January of this year. McCloskey also holds the P. E. I. heavyweight title.

Predicts Big Season For Harness Racing

COLUMBUS, O., May 3 — (AP) — The United States Trotting Association predicted today that harness racing is due for its biggest season in 1951.

Don R. Miller, executive vice-president, based his prediction on the fact requests for racing certificates for trotters and pacers were running about 12 per cent ahead of last year's record.

He said 8,456 applications had been processed by May 1, compared with 7,446 a year ago on the same date.

Last year 10,281 horses saw action and purses soared to \$11,577,771. Miller said the 1951 distribution would exceed \$12,000,000, with more than 11,000 horses splitting the purses.

N. Y. Yankees Smother St. Louis Browns 17-3

New York Yankees powered their way to a 17-3 rout of St. Louis Browns Thursday, tying two records and breaking a third along the way.

Rookie infielder Gil McDougald was a star in the lambasting American League performance, driving in six of the runs on a triple and a base-clearing home run.

Washington Senators swept into undisputed possession of first place in the American League by trouncing Chicago White Sox 7-1 at Chicago.

In the only other day game Thursday, first-baseman Walt Dropp smashed in four runs with a double and single to spark Boston Red Sox to a 6-1 American League victory over Detroit Tigers in Detroit. It was a comeback for Dropp, who had been benched for weak hitting for the last 10 games.

The smashing Yankee victory at St. Louis was the fifth straight for the world champions and the first for sore-armed Allie Reynolds, who made his first start of the season year and limited the Browns to five hits.

A small crowd of 1,912 saw the Bombers unload their vaunted power with a 17-hit attack that produced four home runs, three triples and three doubles.

They scored 11 runs in a wild ninth inning, equally the league mark for total bases in one inning, getting 24 on two singles, two doubles, two triples and three home runs. That figure had been set by the Browns Aug. 7, 1922, with the identical types and quantities of hits. The major league mark of 29 was set by the 1882 Chicago Cubs.

The 11 runs were the most ever tallied in the ninth inning of an American League contest, the previous high being 10 by the 1901 Detroit and 1912 New York clubs.

Stubby Overmire started and was crushed when the Yankees got five in the fifth, two crossing on a round-tripper by Yogi Berra.

Joe Collins hit one of the round-trippers in the ninth with a man on and Jack Jensen capped the inning with a solo blast.

McDougald's six R.B.I.'s in one inning tied the modern mark shared by Fred Merkle of New York Giants (1911), Robert Johnson of the Philadelphia Athletics (1937) and Tom McBride of Boston Red Sox (1945).

Conrado Marrero, scattering nine hits, registered his third straight victory for Washington. The chunky Cuban right-hander has allowed only one run in each of his three games. The Senators belted Billy Pierce and Bob Hain for a dozen blows. Ed Yost hit a homer and batted in three runs.

Chuck Stobbs of the Red Sox shackled the Tigers with six hits to win his third game against no defeats. Teddy Gray, who hurled hitless ball until Bill Goodman singled to start the sixth, suffered his second loss without a win.

Andy Pafko belted a grand-slam homer, a triple and a single while pacing Chicago Cubs to a 9-3 National League victory over Boston Braves in a night game at Boston. Hank Sauer also homered for the Cubs as they broke a three-game losing streak at the expense of right-hander Max Surkont.

Joe Louis And Savold Sign For June 13 Bout

NEW YORK, May 3 — (CP) — Joe Louis and Lee Savold have been fighting professionally for 17 years and somehow or other never got around to facing each other in the ring. Today they agreed to remedy that and signed to meet in a 12-round bout in the Polo Grounds, June 13.

The survivor of this battle of graybeards will earn the right to walk into the chopping fists of heavyweight champion Ezzard Charles in a title bout in September. That is if Ezzard still is boss. The champion has a couple of engagements of his own coming up.

It's fortunate for Savold that he's just getting around to Louis now. The Bomber, who will be 37 in 10 days, apparently has lost the power in his right hand wallop.

Old Joe threw only duds in out-punching Omello Agramonte in a 10-rounder in Detroit last night. "The former heavyweight king dropped the Cuban once for nine but that's way over par for Omello who usually goes up and down like a yo-yo."

That was Joe's fifth win on his latest comeback campaign. He's probably right for Savold, who just passed the 35-year-old mark but hardly ready for Charles again.

Savold, a one-time contender, hasn't done any regular fighting since he won British recognition as world heavyweight champion by stopping England's Bruce Woodcock in four rounds, June 6, 1950.

The Englewood, N. J., blond has been nursing his piece of the title carefully while manager Billy Daly shopped around for the right opponent for a big payday. They think they've got just what they wanted in Louis.

Louis will collect 35 per cent of the net gate while Savold will get 25.
