Prices Res. Post Topped

NEW YORK (AP)—Senator Robert Humphrey of Minnesota has topped a United States-wide poll of delegates to next month's Democratic national convention who stated a preference for the vice-presidential nominee on the party's 1964 U.S. election ticket.

Humphrey was named as a first choice by 341 delegates. Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy, now 42, ranked second, with 220, first Kennedy, more than a dozen other Democratic leaders were listed as personal preferences.

The majority of the delegates declined to state a choice, on the grounds that they have no preference of their own.

MADE NO DECISION
"I have made no decision," Johnson said Thursday at a press conference. But he declared that he would want the vice-presidential nominee to be "a capable, prudent and progressive man with a compassionate consideration for the welfare of the people."

The roll of Democratic convention delegates was taken by Associated Press editors and published in the U.S. today. It is a long list of names, including names of delegates from 48 states and the District of Columbia.

The Democratic national committee lists 3,062 delegates, with 2,516 voters from 48 states and the District of Columbia.

Eight hundred and thirty-six delegates were named from the Atlantic Division.

"Ah, it's by the bottom lifts, and the curtain goes up — then, the excitement, the suspense! Every performance I notice is somehow different — yes, it's all worth it..."

The opera singer's glorious, vapid tenor wafts through the drawing room, the little maid swoons with delight, the knowledgeable, fickle wife bustles with feigned annoyance, and the opera is on. "This life certainly has its ups and its downs, but the best part, they make up for all the rest."

Bill Lord (quoted above) is a young man. He has been with the Canadian Opera Company since leaving the University of Toronto five years ago, first as a very junior assistant, now as company manager, prop and set designer. For a year and a half he has been married to Ariane Manova, who stages the lead role in Die Fledermaus.

WHAT'S IT LIKE?
"What it's like being married to an opera singer, I don't know, it's fascinating. And the way we are, travelling on tour to get with the company, we do not have to face that hard weeks separation which some artists feel. We can be very hard on family life."

Canada Family Size Increases

OTTAWA (CP) — Canadian families are increasing both in numbers and in size, the bureau of statistics said today in a special report.

The bureau reported there were 4,314,000 families in Canada on June 1, 1963, an increase of 25,000 families from June 1, 1962, and 174,000 since the 1961 census.

The average Canadian family in June, 1963, consisted of four persons, up slightly from 3.9 persons for the previous year.

The figures do not include the Yukon and Northwest Territories.

Families were biggest in Quebec and the Maritime provinces, the bureau said. Average family size in these provinces was 4.3 persons. Families in the Prairie provinces averaged 3.9 persons, Ontario families 3.7, British Columbia 3.6.

Families with no children numbered 1.3 million, or 30 per cent of the total, the bureau said. In Quebec, 24.1 per cent of the population, 26.9 in Ontario, 28.3 in the Prairie provinces and 31.4 in British Columbia.

OTTAWA (CP) — Transport Minister Pickersill said Wednesday that the government has approved a \$248,000 subsidy to the Newfoundland-Canada steamship service to help it maintain its one-ship run between Halifax and St. John's, Nfld.

In a written reply to David Orlikow (NDP — Winnipeg North), Mr. Pickersill said that the government has agreed to a change in railway rates, it was no longer economic to operate the boat service and that representations were received from trade and other organizations in favour of the established regular service.
