### Sport Fans Promised Rare Treat On Thursday

Prince Edward Island's sports are in for a rare treat—a wrestling team tag match. On Thursday evening at the Charlottetown Forum four of the greatest names in wrestling will square off in the novel event, most spectacular of the grappling card.

Balbo one of the fastest. Between them they should give Island fans thrills never before experienced.

The party of the second part is made up of Ivan Rasputin and Tiny Mills. Ivan is the Russian bear, a low, squat, hairy individual with the strength of a bear. Mills is the Montana giant, a long, heavy-set man who has a reputation for meanness.

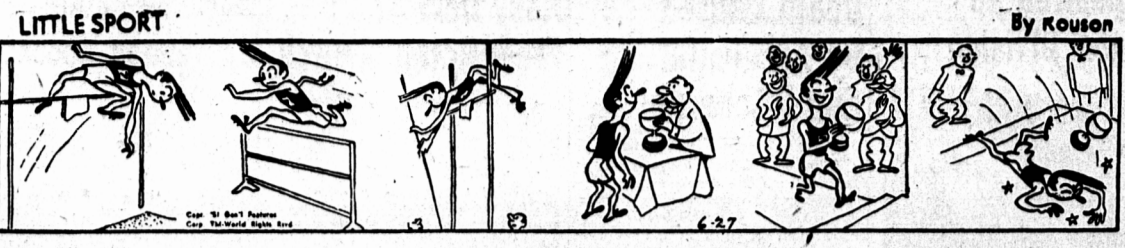

### Rovers Suffer First Loss As Anchors Take 5-1 Victory In League Game

Left hander Jackie Burke of the west end Anchors sent the northeast Rovers down to their first defeat of the season last night with a neat six hitter as the Anchors scored a 5-1 win over the Rovers in a City League baseball game at the Memorial Field diamond. The game was called at the end of six and a half innings.

Burke struck out eleven men in seven innings and only in the first inning did he encounter anything that resembled trouble. Five of the Rovers' hits were singles and the other was a long double by Harold Hennessey in the sixth inning with no one aboard. Burke did not issue a walk.

Righthander Elmer McNeill supplanted Burke with a winning margin in the second inning. McNeill came to the plate with the bases loaded and two out and drove a Murphy pitch into left field for a single. Two runs scored on the play.

The win boosts Johnny Stanley's crew into a second place tie with the Falcons, both teams having a 2-2 record. The Rovers remain in first place with three wins and one defeat and the Stars occupy the basement with one win and three defeats.

Phil Murphy was the losing pitcher but the slim righthander deserved a better fate. He struck out eight men in six innings and came up with a novel performance in the first inning by striking out four men. One of the men he struck out in this inning reached first on a passed ball. Murphy gave up six hits, all singles, but walks and errors proved costly.

Charlie Ryan pulled the hidden ball trick on Harold Hennessey at second base in the sixth inning. Hennessey reached second on a double into centre field and almost got caught off the base when Williams fled out to short. In the decisive actions that followed Hennessey led off base and Ryan tagged him.

Clee Gillis scored the Rovers' only run when he got a life at first on MacLean's error. He stole third and came home on an error by Cairns.

Jackie Cairns poled out two singles for the most hits by one player. Des Trainor, Anchors' first baseman, ended his season-long hit famine by drilling one through the hole between second and short in the fifth.

MacKnight, Cairns and MacKenzie came through with the top fielding plays of the game. Cairns made a lovely pick on a hard hit ball by MacKenzie; MacKenzie made a terrific one hand catch on Hood's long fly to centre; and MacKnight robbed Cairns of a hit in the fifth.

### Irish Bob Murphy Favorite Over Jake La Motta

NEW YORK, June 26—(AP)—Irish Bob Murphy is a 6 to 5 favorite to tame Jake LaMotta tomorrow night at Yankee Stadium in a 12-round fight that has stirred the town more than any light-heavyweight bout since the glory-days of Paul Berlenbach and Jack Delaney.

No Berlenbach or Delaney these, just a couple of guys who like to fight. Perhaps the winner will get a title shot at Joey Maxim next indoor season. But that's not important. In this case, the fight's the thing. Everything adds to a wild shindig.

Some 25,000 fans want to see what happens when Murphy, the hungry ex-sailor from San Diego, conks friend Jake with his leather anchor. The International Boxing Club expects a \$200,000 house with 20,000 seats at \$2.50 on sale at the gate. There will be no home TV or radio for this bout, starting at 10:00 p. m. (EDT).

LaMotta's iron jaw will be undergoing a laboratory test. Jake has had no fights since Ray Robinson put the slug on him at Chicago, Feb. 14 to win his middleweight title. Ringsiders still recall the head-battering LaMotta took from Sugar Ray.

### King Clancy Will Coach Pittsburgh

NEW YORK, June 26—(AP)—Pittsburgh Hornets of the American Hockey League tonight named Frank (King) Clancy of Ottawa as their new coach, replacing Tommy Anderson.

Clancy, coach of Cincinnati Mohawks the last two years, has been a hockey player and official for two decades.

He was a star defenceman with Ottawa Senators and Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League and later became a referee in that league.

Anderson, born in Edinburgh, started for eight seasons with New York Americans as a left winger and defenceman before they dropped out of the league. He will be 41 next month. Clancy is 48.

The announcement was made by Jim Balmer, general manager of the Hornets, who is attending the meetings of A. H. L. executives here.

The shift in coaches came as a surprise. Anderson had brought his Hornets into third place in the A. H. L.'s western division last year and then, after sweeping playoff series with Springfield and Hershey, had carried the team down to the final game of a seven-game title series with Cleveland. It was Anderson's first year with the Hornets.

Balmer said Anderson will move to another Maple Leaf farm club but that the appointment is still indefinite.

Clancy became an N. H. L. referee when his playing days with the Maple Leafs ended. He resigned that post to become Cincinnati coach when the Mohawks first were organized for the 1949-50 season. His team finished fifth in the western division in 1950 and fourth this year.

Recently Clancy was named referee-in-chief of the A. H. L. but turned down that job to take the coaching post with the Hornets.

Hoff met now it's off. Kirsch called me Friday and was to have contacted me yesterday but he didn't. I guess he's been too busy in Berlin because of what happened.
