**BALTIMORE, (CP)**—Native Dancer, the grey colt who ran second to Dark Star in the Kentucky Derby, came back to win the \$113,750 Preakness stake Saturday, but his victory margin—a neck over outsider Jamie K—left his status among the racing greats still in doubt.

The pride of Alfred Vanderbilt's stable, ridden as usual by Eric Guerin, had to battle all the way down the stretch to beat off the challenge of Jim Norris' Jamie K, ridden by Eddie Arco who was trying for his fifth Preakness win.

Third, six lengths back, was Eugene Constantine's Royal Bay Gen.

Dark Star tried to run the same race that gave him the derby victory but although he went out in front from the start he tired well before the finish and wound up fifth in the field of seven.

The Dancer, second grey to win the Maryland turf classic for three-year-olds in the 77 years it has been run, took command on the final turn of the mile-and-three-sixteenths race, pulled away in the home stretch and fought off the last closing Jamie K.

Bruce Campbell's Ram O'War was fourth, followed by Dark Star, Ben Whicker's Tahitian King, Ben Whicker's Tahitian King, Mrs. Gordon Guberson's Corcorand, ridden by Bobbie Summers, last.

A crowd of 30,756 saw the Dancer win his 13th victory in 14 starts.

## Beat Boros Competitions Saturday

**TORONTO, (CP)**—United States Open golf champion Julius Boros shot a 70 at the Oakmont Country Club in Pittsburgh Saturday. During the week-end 6,362 Canadian golfers tried to beat him, 418 did.

The 418 golfers will be presented with bronze medals bearing the words "I beat the U. S. Open champion, Julius Boros, May 23, 1953."

The beat-Boros competition was known officially as the second annual National Golf Day tournament, sponsored jointly in Canada by the Royal Canadian Golf Association, the Canadian Professional Golfers' Association and the U.S. magazine, Life. Proceeds were shared by the Canadian Red Cross and the golf associations of Canada for the promotion of golf among juniors.

The divot-diggers improved on Boros' score of 70-aided by their club handicaps, except in the case of Walt McElroy, former Canadian amateur champion, who shot in 69 in Vancouver without a handicap.

In Toronto, 33 of the 1941 competitors beat Boros, as did 20 of the 233 in London, Ont., 31 of about 1,400 in Montreal and 87 of 785 in Vancouver.

One of the players to beat Boros was Jimmy Burgess, 36, who played at Vancouver on crutches. He shot 83 with a 16 handicap.

# Brooklyn Dodgers Romp To 16-2 Win Over Phils

**Philadelphia, (AP)**—The Philadelphia Phillies had a 42-minute nightmare Sunday. In a horrendous half-inning, they faced 16 Brooklyn batsmen and watched 12 runs score as the Dodgers romped to a 16-2 victory that put a temporary halt to the Phils' bid for the National League lead. What really hurt was that the initial victim of the outburst was Curt Simmons, their ace left-hander. Four more pitchers paraded to the mound before three Dodgers were retired.

## Drop To Third Place

The other half of Philadelphia's ace pitching pair, Robin Roberts, dropped a tight 2-0 verdict to Brooklyn's Preacher Roe Saturday night. So the Phils, who started the week-end in first place, dropping to the second place.

Meanwhile Milwaukee took over the lead by beating Chicago Cubs 5-3 and 5-4 as hard-luck Warren Hacker dropped the Sunday game although his mates outbit the Braves 11-4. Milwaukee scored all three runs in the second inning on just one hit, plus a couple of errors, two walks and a fly ball.

St. Louis Cardinals saw their four-game winning streak broken as Cincinnati Reds beat them 6-0, but rode into second place Sunday on the strength of a 2-0 victory over the Redlegs. Pittsburgh snapped New York Giants' six-game winning streak with an 8-4 victory but took an 11-4 thumping from the fifth-placers Sunday.

**Yankees Widen Lead**  
 New York Yankees widened their American League lead by taking two games from Boston Red Sox. Vic Raschi's four-hitter gave them the Saturday tilt 3-2 and Johnny Sain drove in four runs to back up his own eight-hitter for an 8-4 victory.

Chicago White Sox took two decisions from Detroit Tigers, 4-2 and 3-1, and Washington split with Philadelphia, losing 8-6 Saturday and coming back to down the Athletics 6-3.

Cleveland Indians took the home-run route to whip St. Louis Browns in three week-end games. Al Rosen, Larry Doby and Joe Tipton found the range in Saturday's 5-1 victory. Rosen's three-run blast won Sunday's opener by the same score and Ray Boone connected with the bases loaded as the Tribe took the nightcap 9-8.

The victories boosted Cleveland into second place, 3 1/2 games behind the Yankees.
