SCOTT ACT PETITION.—An Ottawa despatch reports. "A petition has been received at the Department of Justice bearing the requisite number of signatures, asking for the appointment of a day to vote on the repeal of the Scott Act in the city of Charlottetown.

No BILL.—In the case of Captain Rawlings, of the St. John police force, charged by two other members of the force with perjury in an abusive language case, the grand jury on Tuesday, returned "no bill."

THE MEANEST YET.—About the meanest robbery on record is one that was perpetrated in Kingston, Ont., last Thursday evening, when foot-pads sand bagged Wm. A. Pickering, a one armed man, and robbed him of \$12 and an artificial arm.

No BILL.—Police circles at St. John, N.B., have been agitated for some weeks past on account of a charge of perjury having been preferred against Police Inspector Captain Richard Rawlings. At the trial held a few days ago the officer was honorably acquitted. Capt. Rawlings is well and favorably known by many persons here.

MISSIONARY MEETING.—A meeting under the auspices of the Women's Foreign Missionary Society will be held at St. James' Hall this evening. Addresses will be delivered by the Rev. John Read, of the Methodist Brick Church, and the Rev. Mr. Hamlyn, of St. Paul's. Excellent music will be furnished by the choir.

A MODERN SAMSON.—Louis Kuhne, of New York, is out with a challenge against any strong man in the world in lifting heavy weights, etc. Kuhne is a German, stands 5 feet 10 1/2 inches in height, his chest measures 44 inches, and he weighs 210 pounds. He lifts 27 pound dumbbells, juggles a wagon axle that weighs 400 pounds, and performs other great feats of strength.

A DISASTROUS SEASON.—Cable advices announce disastrous losses to cattle ships which arrived in Europe from Canada on the 18th. The Scotia from Montreal to Dundee lost 600 head, the Cree 200, and the Esca Lona 38. This with 354 lost last week on the Lavonia and 151 on the Straits of Magellan makes a disastrous season.

STRANGE CAUSE OF DEATH.—In June last, Mr. J. Smith, liveryman, of Penetang, Ont., had a boy working around the stables, and when carrying a horse hit him with the curry comb on the hip to make him get over faster. The curry-comb cut through the horse's skin. Since that time the horse has been under the Vet's care, but he (the horse) gradually wasted away until Mr. Smith thought he would put an end to the poor beast's sufferings by hitting him on the head with an axe.

BIG GUNS FOR HALIFAX.—The military authorities at Halifax have been notified of the shipment of a powerful gun by the steamer "Gothenburg City" for that port, and three others will follow at an early date. The guns are twice as large as any now in the forts. Their weight is 32 tons, bore 10 inches, and charge of powder 250 pounds. They throw a 500-pound shell. At 2000 yards the shot will penetrate wrought iron 19 1/2 inches. The new guns will be placed in the new fort on Macnaught's Island, in the centre of Halifax harbor. These are the largest guns on this side of the Atlantic, and will add greatly to the defence of Halifax.

In one room was the corpse of the father who had died the day before; in the next room the mother in a drunken stupor; in another room the son frantically intoxicated. The daughter called at the police station to-night to try to get some of the money which the son had on his person when arrested, as they had none in the house to pay expenses for the funeral of the father.

THE LYCEUM.—The Boston Comedy Company will open for a brief season in the Lyceum this (Thursday) evening, when the powerful drama, "Leah, the Forsaken," will be put upon the boards. The "Summerside" papers speak highly of this favorite company's performances in that town. The Journal says: "Webber has reason to be proud of the reception he has received in Summerside this evening, of the fact that he is the only manager who can draw crowded houses here for six nights in succession, and of the pleasant relations that exist between all the members of the company and the people of the town." The Pioneer says: "One circumstance is noted by all, and that is that Mr. Webber allows no vulgarity or anything that would offend the most sensitive to appear on the floor."

THE FINANCIAL SITUATION.

Stringency in the Money Market.

A PANIC IN STOCKS.

MONTREAL, Nov. 19. The Montreal market is again depressed over the disquieting news received from Lombard Street. The Bank of Montreal had a special cable during the forenoon to the effect that the stringency in the money market continued, and that there was a panic in stocks. Canada Pacific stock, which closed at 74 in London yesterday, opened at 71 1/2 to-day, fell to 67 1/2, reached 69 1/2, and then fell to 68 1/2. The whole London list fell from four to six points.

LONDON, Nov. 19. After verging upon a panic, the stock market closed with a better tendency all around. The chief cause of depression was the refusal of the Bank of England to discount bills of Baring Bros. & Co. before maturity.

Irish Members Sentenced.

DUBLIN, Nov. 19.—In the court at Clonmel today a verdict of guilty was rendered against Wm. O'Brien, John Dillon, Patrick O'Brien, members of Parliament. John Bullman, Thomas Walsh, Patrick Meeley and Mr. Bolton were indicted on charges of conspiracy to induce tenants on the Smith-Barry estates not to pay rent. William O'Brien and John Dillon were sentenced to two terms of imprisonment of six months each, but the sentences are to run concurrently. Patrick O'Brien and Cullane were each sentenced to six months imprisonment and Walsh, Meeley and Bolton to four months each. All the sentences were without labor. Congdon, Kelley and Sheehy, members of Parliament, and Father Humphrey indicted on the same charges were found "not guilty," and discharged.

A Marine Board Suggested.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19. The committee appointed by the Secretary of the Treasury, under date of Oct. 11th last, to consider and report their views upon suggestions of United States delegates upon suggestions of the International Marine Conference, have submitted a bill for the establishment of a Marine Board for the advancement of the merchant marine. The bill provides that the Board shall be under the direction of the Secretary of the Treasury.

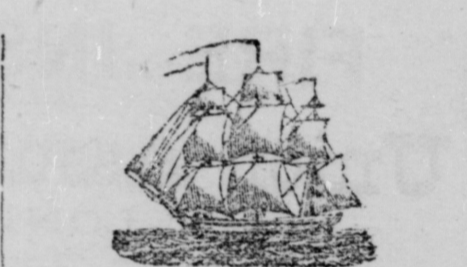
Parnell's Leadership.
