The Methodist Conference.

(Condensed from St. John Sun.)
MARYSVILLE, June 17.
The conference met this morning at nine o'clock, with General Superintendent Carman in the chair. The devotional exercises were participated in by Rev. C. H. Paisley, Rev. Mr. Comber, Mr. Hutchings of St. John and the chairman.
The children's fund committee report was read and adopted as follows: The number of claimants on the fund was found to be 209 to be paid for pro rata as the fund will allow. It was resolved by the committee that the treasurer be authorized to borrow \$65, the assessment of the Hampton circuit, for the children's fund and that Rev. Mr. Tippett give his note for the amount to the treasurer:—

The financial secretaries were authorized to settle with the brethren in their districts at the rate of \$37 for each claimant on the fund. The report was adopted with the exception of the memorial of the St. Stephen district which was deferred.
Rev. Job Shenton read the report of the general conference fund giving the amounts received from the districts in the N. B. and P. E. I. conference as follows:—

Rev. Job Shenton was appointed treasurer of the general conference fund.
Rev. Dr. Stewart moved that the conference had heard with much pleasure the Rev. Dr. Lathern, editor of the *Wesleyan*, and pledged itself to put forth every effort to secure a still more widely extended circulation, believing that the existence and circulation of the *Wesleyan* are necessary to the success of our work in these provinces, and also expressed confidence in the management of Rev. S. F. Huestis, and assured him that he may depend upon the warm sympathy and the financial help of this conference. This was seconded and carried, and Rev. Dr. Lathern made some remarks.
Rev. Benjamin Chappell reported for the theological union, stating that it was out of debt. Rev. Mr. Harrison and Rev. Mr. Teasdale, of Halifax, would preach the annual sermon next year. This was adopted, and Rev. E. Evans made some remarks with referen e to it.
Rev. J. A. Clark spoke of the Rev. W. W. Percival, at one time a member of the conference, but now in the Presbyterian Church in British Columbia. Mr. Percival, he said, while stationed at Milltown had handled some of the funds of the conference. It was claimed that Mr. Percival had misappropriated the money and the conference should do something in the matter. The amount paid into the superannuation fund by Mr. Percival could be taken to offset this. He moved that a committee of three be appointed to inquire into the matter and report back to the conference.
The motion was adopted and the following committee appointed:—Rev. Dr. Stewart, Wm. Heard and Wm. Lindsay.
Rev. E. Evans submitted a report of the missionary committee. The following statistics were given:—

Boston Markets.
BOSTON, June 15.
POTATOES—With larger receipts and a dull trade prices have declined about 10c per bu. For the best Houlton Hebrons 95c is an outside price, and best Rose will not go over 90c. Maine Central stock rule mostly at 80 to 85c, and Northern at 75 to 80c. P. E. Island Chenagos dropped to 75c, which was the rate for most of this week's receipts. New Southern sold at \$3 to \$4 per bbl.
EGGS—There is not much change to note in the egg market. Receipts are kept up and prices are firmly maintained. Sales of Eastern extras at 15c, and Western and Provincial at 14c to 15c per dozen.
FISH—Mackerel have been arriving more freely the past week, but with an improved trade prices have been maintained. Sales in fare lots at \$6 25 to \$7 25 per bbl, sea packed, with bbl. A few fares all large rimmed sold at about \$9 per bbl. About 330 bbls received from Nova Scotia brought \$9 per bbl. Regular inspected lots rule at \$7.50 for medium and \$9.55 to \$10 for large No. 3. Nothing of consequence has been done in old Mackerel and prices are unchanged. Some 1,600 bbls fresh mackerel arrived from Nova Scotia and sold at from \$4 to \$7 per 100. Total receipts of salt mackerel for the week were 1000 bbls.
