Grain

WINNIPEG, Aug. 26 — (CP) — Prices generally moved narrowly and irregularly in inactive trade today on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange.

Commercial demand was not aggressive. However, some buying attributed to export interests appeared in barley in connection with either old or anticipated export business.

Domestic shippers picked up both oats and barley. Liberal offerings were well taken. Increased hedging and a few buying orders for American interests held rye prices steady. Flax received processor support.

Export loadings of Canadian wheat included 170,000 bushels for Germany, 365,000 for Lebanon, 630,000 for the United Kingdom, 60,000 for Belgium, 645,000 for Italy, 200,000 for India and 350,000 for Greece.
